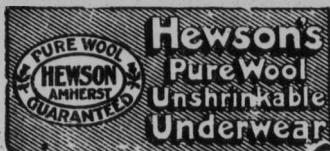

FERGUSON VS. SWEDISH

LUMBER CO.

In the Supreme Court, at Fredericton, Friday, judgment was given in Ferguson vs. Swedish Canadian Lumber Co.—Ordered that the verdict be set aside and a new trial granted on terms as follows: That the defendants on or before 23rd of April next pay plaintiff or his attorney the taxed costs of trial, and that they shall within the said time give security for the payment of the amount of any verdict which in a new trial the plaintiff shall recover and sustain not exceeding the amount of the present verdict, \$5,750.02. Such security may be by payment of the said sum into court subject to order of court or by such other security as Mr. Justice White shall deem sufficient and approves of. On failure of the defendant to pay such costs and give the security within said time, this motion shall be dismissed with costs.
