### LOCAL & OTHER ITEMS

Messrs. Martin and McLean have called a public meeting to be held in the hall at Brookfield on Friday evening next, 23rd inst.

"I have given my life to my country," says Sir Wilfrid Laurier. And such answers that he gave his country to Messrs. Sifton, Barrow, Turiff and Fraser.

It is reported that Miss Conquest, of Summerside, a seamstress, has through the death of an uncle in England fallen heir to a bequest of £2,000.

Off Meagher's Beach, at the mouth of Halifax Harbor, the steamer John Irwin, from Port Hood, collided with and sank the schooner Regina B on Monday last.

Felix Critelli, son of Joseph Critelli, lost his life in a fire which destroyed the old skating rink at Niagara Falls last Tuesday night week. His charred remains were found in the debris.

Six Austrian warships are anchored off Spezza, in Dalmatia, Crownland of Austria-Hungary. They are not more than ten miles from Antivars, the sole support of Montenegro.

The west-bound Atchison, Topoka and Santa Fe passenger train from Chicago collided with a freight train at Baddock, near Newton, Kansas, early Monday, and the engineer was killed and 22 injured.

All over Canada there were only two elections by acclamation on Monday. These were those of Hon. Mr. Brodeur Rouville, P. Q., and A. F. McLean, in South York Ont. This shows what a contest is waged.

A London despatch of the 17th says: All the men of the home fleet absent from their ships on liberty have been suddenly recalled. Inasmuch as the reason for this has not yet been ascertained the order has caused considerable excitement.

Sir Charles Tupper was sworn in a member of the Privy Council at Buckingham Palace on Monday. He had been appointed on last King's Birthday. King Edward showed the greatest kindness to the veteran Canadian statesman.

Henry C. Kamp, his wife and two children, were burned to death near Hurst, Mich., by forest fires. Another child is missing. Four bodies were found in the ruins of the farm house, and it is feared there is little possibility of the child having escaped.

The Canada Gazette, the Canadian Government official publication, states that the debt of Canada on September 30th last, was \$233,216,288, and the debt on Sept. 30th, 1907, was \$251,572,452. This shows an increase of debt for one year of \$18,356,164. Not bad for a would-be surplus government.

Mr. J. J. Johnston, of this city, who had been attending a political meeting at Fort Augustus on Monday night met with a painful accident on Tuesday morning. He crossed the river in a boat to catch the train at Bedford Station, and when leaving the boat it went from under him and he fell, seriously injuring his arm.

The two weeks mission given in St. Dunstan's Cathedral by the Jesuit Fathers, Devlin, Campbell and Coffey, came to a conclusion Sunday evening. The closing sermon was by Rev. Father Campbell, and was an exceptionally able discourse. The exercises were concluded with renewal of the baptismal vows, Papsal blessing and solemn Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament, his Lordship the Bishop officiating. Nearly 5,000 persons approached the Sacraments.

At Lone Tree Creek, Wisconsin, on Sunday night last, a terrific wind picked up the caboose of a work train, tore it away from its couplings and carried it over the edge of a hill. It dropped thirty feet with its forty occupants, nearly all laborers, and piled them in a helter-skelter confusion among the wreckage where it landed. Six men were killed and probably as many more were injured, while twenty or twenty-five or thirty were injured, many seriously.

We deeply regret to record the death of Cyril J. Ryan, son of Mr. D. D. Ryan, Purser of the steamer Empress, which occurred at Moosejaw, Saskatchewan, on Sunday last. The sad intelligence reached here Monday morning. Previous telegrams announced his serious illness of typhoid fever. Deceased was only 22 years of age, and was a telegrapher on the C. P. R. His brother, Ed, who resides at Winnipeg, was with him when he died. His parents have the sympathy of the community in their sore bereavement. The remains will arrive here for interment, R. I. P.

At the meeting of the Executive Council, held on Thursday evening last, Dr. S. N. Robertson, Principal of Prince of Wales College, Mr. D. C. McLeod, of the law firm of McLeod & McLeod, and Mr. F. J. Boote, editor of *L. Impartial* Tignish, were appointed as an educational commission, to deal with the matter of cheaper text books, etc. Provision was made at the last session of the Legislature for the appointment of this commission. But it shows how little in earnest the Government are in the matter when they left the appointment till the same meeting at which it was decided to dissolve the Legislature.

Fifteen persons lost their lives in the burning of the Detroit railroad in a relief train which was carrying the inhabitants of the little village of Metz to safety from the forest fires which were sweeping away their homes. The ill-fated train was derailed by the spreading of rails at Nowiski siding, a few miles south of Metz, and the terrified refugees were forced to abandon the cars and rush for safety either down track with burning forests on either side or into ploughed fields near the siding. Eleven of the victims were women and children, who were unable to escape quickly enough from the car they were occupying. Their charred bodies were found there when the rescuers reached the scene. Two of the men victims were members of the train crew. Mr. and Mrs. Fred Wagner died from the heat and exhaustion on their farm near the scene of the wreck, and Mr. and Mrs. Fred Nowicki, Jr. lost their lives in a burning house near the siding where the wreck occurred.

### LOCAL & OTHER ITEMS

Daniel McIntosh of Pictou County, aged 35, was killed by a train near Glace Bay, the other day.

Sir Thomas Shaughnessy, at Winnipeg the other day, said the C. P. R. will double the track of the whole road from Fort William to the Pacific Coast. That is what the authority to issue new capital of \$50,000,000 was secured for. The company will shortly operate trains over the mountain by electricity generated in the vicinity from water power.

At Southampton, near Hd. St. Peter's Bay, on Oct. 1st inst, Neil McIntyre, aged 73 years. May his soul rest in peace.
