The War

RUSSIA AND THE TREATY OF '56.

It is confirmed that Russia had asked
for a revision of the treaty of 1856.
The provisions of this treaty forbid the Russian
fleet entering the Dardanelles and the
Bosphorus from the Black Sea, and limit the
Russian fleet in the Black Sea to a small
steamer. They also prohibit Russia and
Turkey maintaining on the Black Sea coast
any military or marine armaments, and
generally restrict the Black Sea by the inter-
diction from the waters of any vessels of
war belonging to the Powers, possessing
its coast, or any other power. This
declaration on the part of Russia has been
simultaneously made in London and by the
Cabinet at Constantinople. Vienna and
Berlin is believed sure to indicate Russia's
readiness to insist on the recognition of
her claims by force.

The official journal at Constantinople
states that the Sultan has ordered a
military attack; that he has 60,000 men
and 12 armoured frigates.

STILL ADVANCING.
London, 11 p. m. Nov. 16.—A despatch
from Vienna, dated 10th inst., states
that the Prussian army of the north
occupied Chantilly in the department of
Aisne, from that point they threaten
Cambrai, Paoli and other fortified
places in that neighborhood.

FRENCH MILITARY MOVEMENTS.
London, Nov. 16.—The "Times" this
afternoon has several telegrams from
Berlin dated to-day which contain the
following intelligence:—The French
movement toward Chantilly is apparently
intended as preliminary to an attack on
the western Bank of the German army
near investing Paris.

ADVISED FROM TOURS.
Tours, Nov. 16.—Advised from Or-
leans state that among the prisoners cap-
tured near there on the 9th, were the
wedges of the Prussian commander Von
Der Tau, and a General of the Prus-
sians, who was governor of Orleans during
their occupation of that city.

The city of Chantilly, capital of the
Department of the Eure-et-Loire, has
again been occupied by the French.

RUSSIA'S NOTE CREATES CONTERNA-
TION AMONG THE POWERS.

London, Nov. 15.—The Times corre-
spondent telegraphs from Vienna to-day,
that the Russian note creates a great
excitement in political circles. Count Von
Beust will take immediate and serious
steps. An alliance between England,
Austria, Italy and Turkey, which has
been contemplated by Count Von Beust
and Count Andranassy.
