Concert Criticism.

Editor Evening Telegram.
Dear Sir,—I have read with very great pleasure "Cherubino's" criticism of the Methodist Guards' band concert, which lately appeared in the Daily News. As your correspondent "Arpeggio" says it is quite refreshing, and I am sure is quite educative from a literary point of view. I have not the least doubt that its effect upon the promoters of and participants in our local musical efforts will be beneficial. He is rather hard on the newspapers for publishing, and the scribes for writing, the reports of such functions that we have been used to in the past. He seems to forget one very important consideration, however, which affects this town, I had almost said peculiarly, in the matter of public entertainments. All, or practically all, of them have for their object the pecuniary benefit of some local institution, and are contributed to by amateurs almost entirely, for where the name of an occasional professional does appear upon such a programme, he or she does not appear for the time being in a professional capacity. Now, if a large proportion of those amateurs, possessing what "Cherubino", perhaps would style mediocre attainments, knew beforehand that they were to be subjected to the stinging lash of his virile pen, they would not be willing to put themselves in such a position, consequently they would suffer in not being able to use the little gift they have, and by so using, perhaps, attaining in time to the dizzy heights our friend "C." has set for them.

The beneficiaries would suffer by the cessation of all such efforts on their behalf, and the concert going public would suffer by missing the sound of many voices which are at least pleasing to them, if not quite up to "C.'s" ideas in other respects. However, my letter is growing on me and I must see if something of a practical nature can not be got out of "C.'s" contribution. He says the band itself is not properly constituted for indoor concerts. Your correspondent "Arpeggio" admits it, and shows that those responsible are quite as well aware of the fact as "C." himself. He goes further and says the defect exists not of choice or as the result of ignorance, but because funds are lacking to supply the necessary instruments. The Guards' band, I understand, has some generous friends who have done nobly in the past, but they cannot do everything. Now, I am a poor man, trying to make two ends meet on a salary, but I will make a proposition. If within two months the bandmaster of the Guards can show me that he has secured all the additional instruments mentioned by "Cherubino" and the men to play them, I will give two piccolos, or the value of them if not more than ten or twelve dollars, provided always our friend "Cherubino" is found among the subscribers for an equal
