Teachers' Convention.

An unusually interesting evening was spent at the Teachers' Convention last night. The first paper was read by Mr. Bradbury, A.A., Principal of the High School, Heart's Content, and dealt with the teaching of Geography and History. Mr. Bradbury urged the importance of these subjects in the school curriculum, demonstrated their correlation and emphasized the necessity of teaching them so far as possible from actual observation. He pleaded that at every stage of instruction the relation between cause and effect should be drawn from the pupils, and gave many apt illustrations of the points he made. Mr. Crew, Principal of the High School Bonaville, Mr. Norman, Principal of the High School, Coley's Point; Mr. Burke, Supt. R. C. S.; Prof. Nichols and Miss Simpson, one of the Bell Island teachers, spoke in this order and expressed their delight with Mr. Bradbury's paper.

Mr. P. G. Butler, Principal of the Springdale St. Commercial School of St. John's, next delivered with great zeal and enthusiasm a paper dealing particularly with pensions in relation to the teacher's work and life. He showed that an efficient service of teachers was an utter impossibility unless due provision was made for the old age of the teacher; that the importance of the teacher to a country's prosperity and future welfare was manifest, but that not nearly sufficient care was taken by the State to fit him or her for the great responsibilities of the office. Mr. Hodder, of the Heart's Delight school, heartily endorsed the opinions expressed by Mr. Butler, and urged in connection therewith that the beginning was important and that further provision for the training of the teacher for the grave service demanded of him was a necessity.

For Hudson Bay.

The auxiliary topsail schr. Laddie, owned by Capt. Bartlett of Brigus, arrived here to-day from the above place to take in oil and supplies for Hudson Bay and will go on the same route as the wrecked Jeanie. She has been chartered by the Canadian Government from Capt. S. W. Bartlett and she takes on part of a crew here. She is supplied with a new gasoline engine capable of bringing her along at the rate of 6 knots, and the vessel has quite a history attached to her. She was built at Fogo, and years ago was abandoned at the icebergs but did not sink and was towed into the westward by the s.s. Greyhound and purchased by the late Capt. C. Dave, who repaired her. When asked some few questions about the vessel by our reporter this morning, her captain would not give any information.

Good Fishery News.

The s.s. Fogota arrived here from the north at 11 a.m. to-day. The crew report great fishery news all along the coast from Change Islands to Bay de Verde. Remarkably good work has been done at Grate's Cove, Bay de Verde, in fact the whole north shore up to Carbonear. Yesterday traps had from 50 to 60 qts. at Bay de Verde. At Cat Harbor, Fogo, Wadhams, Peckford's Island and vicinity big work is being done both with traps and hook and line.

Grate's Cove-Traps average 5 qts. just two weeks; boats 1 1/2 to 2 qts.

Old Pelican-Traps 1 to 9 qts.; boats 1 to 3.

Lark Harbor-Good sign of fish yesterday.

Rival Lovers Fight.

Duel to Death on a Brooklyn Street. New York.-Walter Obolsky and Waskaw Mowski, rivals for the heart and hand of Mary Kalowski, fought a duel to the death with butcher knives in a Brooklyn street joint last night as the object of their joint affections and a crowd of acquaintances looked on. After fifteen minutes' agonizing, Obolsky fell mortally wounded, with his enemy's knife piercing his abdomen and protruding from his back. Mowski, the victor, fled, and was found covered with blood in a cellar. He was locked up.

The men met on the street as Obolsky was accompanying the young woman to a moving picture entertainment. The quarrel followed. The girl threw herself first upon one and then the other, sobbing and kissing each, and begging them not to fight on her account.
