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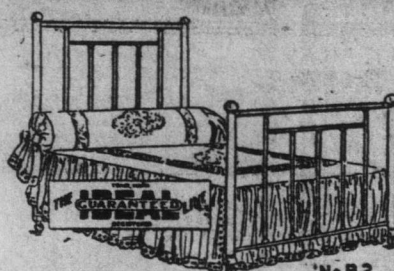

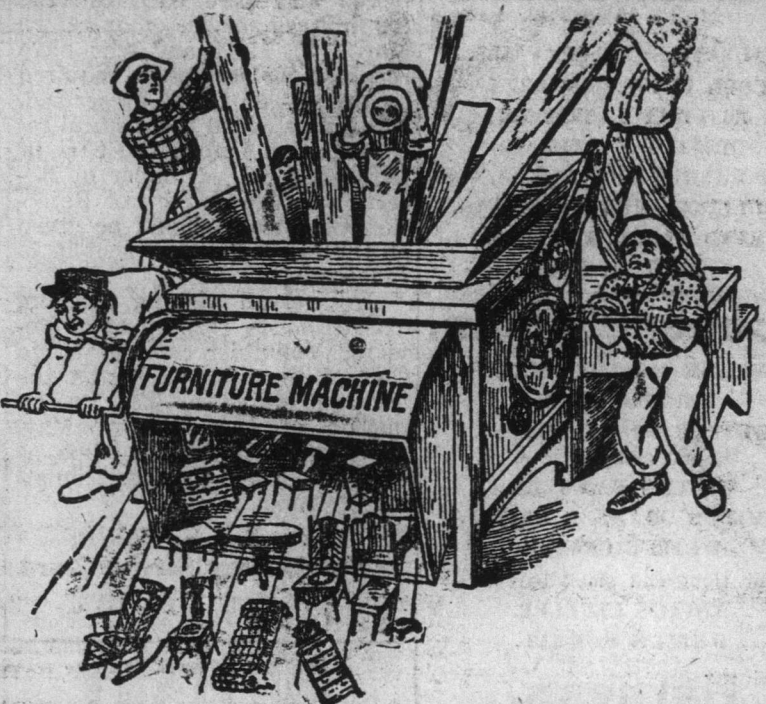

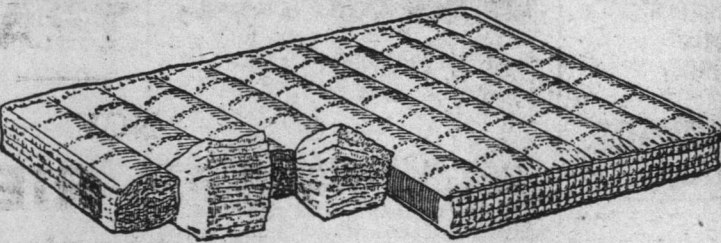

The Freedom of the Seas

AS GERMANY WOULD HAVE IT.

In the course of an article on the
U-boat in the Deutsche Revue for
March, Vice-Admiral Hermann Kirch-
hoff writes that Germans understand
by "Freedom of the Seas" nothing
less than a complete breaking of the
hitherto unlimited British domination
of the sea, a break-up of the British
world domination—in short, the over-
throw of Germany's mortal enemy, the
Power which is harmful to the whole
world. To this end England must be
set out of Calais-Boulogne (and be
prevented from making the Channel
Tunnel), out of Lemnos, Egypt, etc.;
Germany must retain the Flanders
coast, the Suez Canal must be inter-
nationalized, the German fleet abroad
must be strengthened, and war har-
bours, etc. must be built in the Ger-
man colonies. Only when these con-
ditions have been fulfilled will Ger-
many, by her fleet and her air power,

be enabled to hold England in check,
and in future be in a position to pre-
vent the recurrence of such a terrible
war as the present. It is now a ques-
tion of Germany or England-America.
England's clear intention to destroy
entirely Germany's overseas trade
must be thoroughly brought to nought.
England must indeed ask Germany
for peace, for only by the overthrow

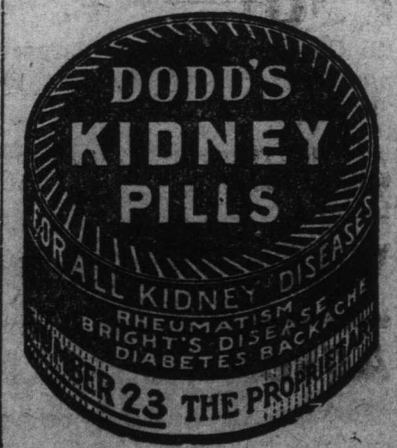
of this arbitrary country is the free-
dom of the seas to be attained.—Re-

Thoughts Upon the Times

(By PATRIOT.)

There is an old saw which is often
quoted to prove that the established
laws of society, like those of nature,
are inexorable and who tramples up-
on them must sooner or later pay the
penalty. "The mills of the gods grind
slowly yet they grind exceeding
small." The Good Book also says:
"As a man sows so shall he reap."

For the past ten years Mr. Coaker
has been sowing the seeds of dis-
content and distrust among the people.
There are now unmistakable signs that
Mr. Coaker is reaping what he has
sown. The sturdy fisherman—the
most independent and hardy type of
man in the world—who is daily
breathing in health and strength un-
der the open sky, surrounded by Na-
ture's wonders, has for years been
taught to believe that he was being de-
prived from enjoying the fruits of his
labors and cheated out of his just
earnings. Led on by an unscrupulous
demagogue, who depicted them as
"downtrodden underdogs," always at
the mercy of the "grabbler" mercan-
tiles, the fishermen have al-
lowed themselves to be exploited, and
their numerical strength organized, to
place in power one of the most in-
competent and unscrupulous sets of po-
liticians that ever had control of the
government of this country. The ex-
igencies of the war have been used,
not only in this country, but in all
countries, to expedite deeds which in
ordinary times would not be permitted
to bear the light of day. Hence the
present conglomeration of incompet-
ent and needy politicians now in pos-
session of the government, find them-
selves there, not by the will of the
people, but through the ambitious and
greedy designs of the late Premier—
Sir Edward Morris—and the Reid
Nfd. Co. It suited their purpose to
have it so. The former got a seat in
the House of Lords as his price; the
latter got control of not only the ser-
vice government of this country, but
the country itself and everything in
it. Our representative democracy is a
farce; and our governmental activities
have become a bye-word in the
country. The country to-day is no
longer ruled by representatives ap-
pointed by the people, but by the Reid
Nfd. Co.

The question as to whether these
men who fill our public offices are in
all respects, fit and competent, to as-
sume the duties and responsibilities as
our rulers, is none of our concern. It
is entirely the business of the Reid
Nfd. Co. to say who shall or
shall not be our rulers. They make
their own laws and set at naught the
laws made by the former Newfound-
land Governments. Witness their re-
cent increase in rates on their trains
and steamers. Witness their defian-
ce of our quarantine and vaccination
regulations in North Sydney, as out-
lined by Mr. Morine in the House of
Assembly on May 6th, last.

Mr. Morine:—"In the North Syd-
ney papers on order appeared, appar-
ently telegraphed from the Department

of the Colonial Secretary, signed by
the Colonial Secretary to the effect
that no person resident in the Pro-
vinces of Nova Scotia or New Brun-
swick would be allowed to come to
Newfoundland unless he had been
vaccinated within seventeen years and
more than fourteen days. . . . Then I
went back to the Reid Nfd. Co. peo-
ple and asked them if they had seen
this order. They said no; that as far
as they were concerned they were act-
ing upon orders received from Head
Office, and they would not recognize
any other."

The so-called fishermen's Govern-
ment, led by Mr. Coaker, have to all
intent and purposes, handed the
country and everything in it over to
the Reid Nfd. Co. The people are
only now beginning to realize what
has happened, and judging by the feel-
ing abroad, there are anxious days
ahead for Mr. Coaker and his asso-
ciates in the Government, in the
immediate future. No wonder he is an-
xious to make new friends. No wonder
he appears willing to let by-gones be
by-gones. The people are now be-
ginning to find out the kind of man he
really is, and Mr. Coaker himself is
beginning to learn that after all the
Wise Man was right when he said,
"As a man sows so shall he reap."

Mr. Coaker has been for ten years
poisoning the waters at the fountain
head. He need not be surprised,
therefore, if he finds that the waters
of the stream cannot be sweet.
But that is not all. The country
will have to suffer for many years to
come for Mr. Coaker's teaching and
his final betrayal of the country to the
Reids. When the glamour of the war
is over we will realize it in all its
hideous details. If the difficulties
are to be met and overcome whom
have we in public life capable of tak-
ing hold of public affairs and bring-
ing order out of chaos? There is only
one man in the country who would
have the confidence of the people, and
that man is the Right Hon. Sir Robert
Bond.

Let the people at once from all
parts of the country rally to Sir
Robert Bond's banner, the good old
Liberal Standard that never brought
disgrace upon Newfoundland.

Let the country from one end of it
to the other demand from His Excel-
lency the Governor a General Elec-
tion next fall. The Extension Bill was
not carried through with the consent
of the people. Everywhere there is
political unrest; everywhere there is
a clamour for a cleaner and more
direct control of the Government by
the people. It is "up to" the people
themselves to act.

Old Ships Bring Fortune.

The story of how two small steam-
ers which were laid up for 20 years
because no purchasers could be found
at any price have just been sold for
\$1,200,000 because of a new law, and
the case is said to be the most re-
markable on record as showing the
extraordinary advance in the value of
vessel property. The two freighters,
Port Caroline and Port Denison, were
already old when at the end of the
Boer war the owners decided to lay
them up. They were out of commis-
sion until 1915. Then they were re-
cassied and offered for sale. Nobody
would buy them. Now word has
reached Boston that their lucky own-
ers have disposed of them for more
than a million and a quarter in cash.

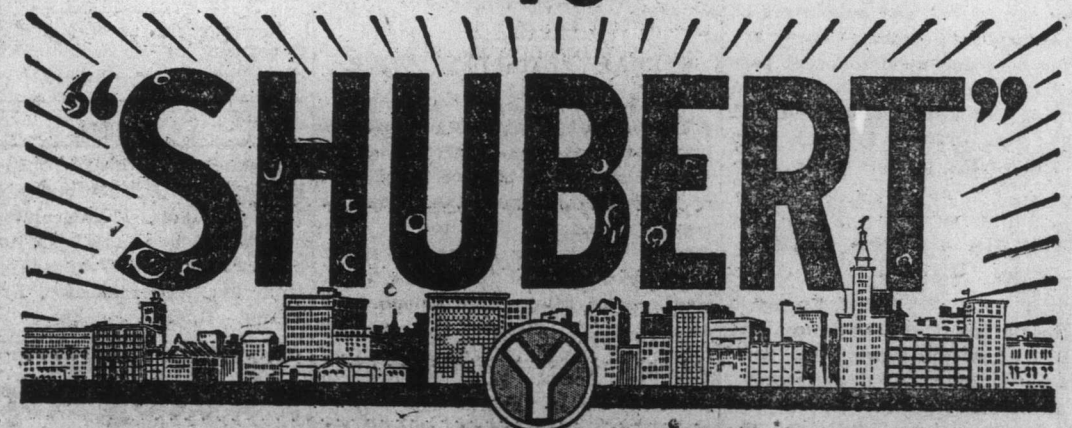
The Hardest Worked Man.
