French Competition.

Are we in danger of losing our Italian market through French competition? This is a question which was intelligently discussed in an article in Saturday's Trade Review, in the course of which the writer showed that the French menace is a serious one, and one that we cannot afford to make light of. Through a generous bounty offered by their Government, the French are enabled to undersell us in a market in which, until the ruinous Regulations of 1920 were enforced, we held a monopoly. The facts of the situation as it is at present, are these: Last year the French offered "soft cure fish" to the Italians at a price 20 shillings below that fixed for our Labrador fish. Instead of attempting to defeat the French at their own game, our ill-advised Advisory Board attempted retaliatory measures with disastrous results, for Italy purchased over 100,000 qtls. of our rival's fish. And we have nearly this quantity of old fish remaining unsold in the Mediterranean market.

This year the French will probably have at least 400,000 qtls. of fish, and after 150,000 qtls. have been deducted for home consumption, 250,000 qtls. remain for export. Already it is reported that Bordeaux merchants have offered new fish to Italy. A prohibitive import tax prevents Newfoundland from selling fish to France. Thanks to the Government bounty, the French merchants are enabled to sell fish to Italy at between \$6.00 and \$7.00 per quintal, whilst the consumer in France must pay nearly \$17.00 for the fish he eats. And we are compelled to see fish caught at our very doors, sold in a market we formerly monopolised, at a lower price than we could possibly offer, and all because of an unfair bounty which is paid from money borrowed from Great Britain.

These briefly, are the facts and now the question arises, what are we going to do about it? There is need for immediate action if we are not to have our export trade to Italy irreparably damaged. Two things should be done. Firstly, the export tax on fish leaving the country should be removed, and secondly, the British Government should be urged to take some action to prevent the inhabitants of this colony from being victimised by the French with the help of British gold. This matter is one of paramount importance and it will require a considerable amount of careful attention. Let us hope that this attention will not be given it too late, and that we shall not lose our Italian market through inattention and neglect.

Our Book Review.

"THE FOG" by W. Dudley Pelley. (Dicks & Co.)

I found "The Fog" a great relief from the sordid melodrama which pervades so many modern novels. It is a refreshingly human story of small town life written by an author who knows his subject, and has further, a thorough knowledge of human nature. I can imagine no finer hero than Nathan Forge, who handicapped by having a bigoted, hypocritical father and a neurotic mother, yet managed to grope his way through the fog surrounding him until he reached ultimate happiness and success. All the characters in the book are finely drawn but whilst Madeline Theddon and Caleb Gridley made an instant appeal to me, I have never before encountered such utterly repulsive people as Jonathan and Anna Forge and Millie Richards. "The Fog" is a book that should commend itself to all for the finesse with which the various characters are drawn, the originality of the theme, and the humour and pathos which it contains.

"JACOB'S LADDER" by E. Phillips. (Dicks & Co.)

I doubt if anywhere, there is an author more universally popular than E. Phillips Oppenheim and the announcement that he has published a new book will be hailed with delight by the multitude who derive pleasure from his works. "Jacob's Ladder" is a book which shows yet another side to Mr. Oppenheim's versatility and provides excellent entertainment. The least that can be said of it is that it is Oppenheim at his best.

Agnes P. Duff Arrives.

BLOWN TO SEA FROM BARBADOS.

The great anxiety for the safety of the sch. Agnes P. Duff was relieved last evening when at 7 o'clock the vessel, O.K., dropped anchor in the harbor. It will be remembered that the Agnes P. Duff was loading molasses at Barbados when the last hurricane swept the place. The owners here, Messrs. Campbell & McKay, were advised that the vessel had gone to sea during the storm, but beyond this, in spite of frequent enquiry, nothing further was heard until the vessel arrived here. She was at anchor in the bay waiting to finish her cargo, which was being loaded from lighters, when at daylight on the morning of the 8th the wind began to freshen and a heavy sea made, breaking at every cast in 7 fathom patches. At about 10 a.m. the vessel began to drag, and at noon one of the anchors gave out at the ringbolt; the other was gotten aboard and the vessel put to sea. The crew worked hard at the sails as the forecast and mainmast were bent, the vessel getting clear with a double reefed mainsail and jumbo. Shortly after dark more canvas was put on and with a strong breeze from the S. E. the captain headed for this port. The wind held for 5 or 6 days and the trip to here was made in 19 days. Some thirty packages of molasses were required to complete the cargo, but these and the ship's papers had to be left behind. Capt. Jas. Snow of Bay Roberts, Mate Kirby, Boatswain, Cook Shute and Seamen Nosworthy, Barrett and Mercer, who comprised the crew, are thankful for their escape. The hurricane swept several steamers out to sea and also a number of lighters, but it was not ascertained what afterwards happened to them. Capt. John House, of the Little Princess, who was in hospital suffering from typhoid fever, came up by the vessel, which experienced splendid weather after leaving the storm area.

Unnecessary Anxiety.

After causing a lot of anxiety to friends and a deal of enquiry by the authorities, the sch. "Branch Hallway", which left here about 19 days ago for the South Coast and was supposed to have been out in the storm, has been located to-day at St. Joseph's, Salmonier. Messages to every office along the coast had been sent by the Marine and Fisheries Department in order to ascertain if anything of the schooner or her crew could be learned. This unnecessary search for vessels could be avoided if the captains when they reach port would report their arrival immediately and not wait for 48 hours at St. John's, as the law calls for under Cap. XXIII. of the Customs Act, May 18th, 1915. It is apparent that an alteration in the Statute is necessary.

FATHER PLACED UNDER BONDS. The sorry spectacle of two small boys aged 13 and 14 respectively, appearing at the bar of the Police Court, to answer a charge of larceny, was seen this morning. The lads were charged with taking two pairs of boots. They pleaded guilty. Inspector General Hutchings said that this was their first offence but he had been given to understand that the elder of the boys was an incorrigible. The father of this lad was in court and was placed under bonds of \$100 for the future good behaviour of his son. The father of the other boy was dead, and the latter was warned of the consequences which would follow a repetition of his act. And so, we have still another argument in favour of the establishment of a reformatory. The public are still apathetic and the Government, too, remains inactive. Do they intend to remain so? If they do, the consequences, and they will be serious, will be upon their own heads. Newspaper agitation seems unable to accomplish anything, but we shall continue to bring matters of this kind to the attention of our readers, until someone will be found who is public spirited enough to attempt to accomplish something in connection with the erection of a reformatory.

The Nystrand's Fish Cargo.

Yesterday it was reported that s.s. Nystrand which loaded the balance of last year's Government fish, had arrived at Falmes, Greece. The cargo of 2,000 casks, containing over 9,000 quintals, had been found unsuitable for the market. If the report is true it would let the Government in for a further heavy loss. The fish was bought last November under Government guarantee at \$8 per quintal, and at best could only fetch half that price. It is stated that after the fish, which for the past nine months, had been stored in St. John's, had owing to a spell of exceptionally hot weather, the disposal of this lot of the Government fish venture will be watched with interest. On enquiry at the Marine and Fisheries Department to-day the Telegram was told that they had not been advised of the Nystrand reaching Greece.

West Coast Conditions.

FLLOUR SCARCITY AT ST. LAWRENCE. Conditions on the whole are very dull along the West Coast, although in those places where fish were plentiful things are improving, so a business man who recently returned from a visit to all the principal settlements on the coast told the Telegram to-day. The shore fishery was very poor all over the coast, but all the bankers did exceedingly well. Business has improved very much in those places which had crews at the bank fishery. These settlements include Grand Bank, Burin, Bellefleur and English Harbour. At Gaultois, Wilson Garland is buying shore fish at prices ranging from \$4 for merchantable down. At Burin and Marytown the best price is \$5.50. St. Lawrence and Harbor Breton are in a bad way. At the former place there is very little flour and fish and potatoes form the only articles of diet. Between Burgeo and Channel conditions are very bad as the fishery there was a failure.
