The deceased was a well-known and respected person at the age of 78 years, and enjoyed almost perfect health up to the last year of his life, and at his last hour was assisted by Rev. Fr. She was of a courteous disposition particularly amongst her co-workers at the Imperial Tobacco Co., who testified their appreciation by covering her casket with wreaths of flowers.
