While the new law has flexible provisions, they will not take the place of an actual revision of the law in case the new measure is found to be unsatisfactory or conditions materially change. Not on v is this obvious from the fact that the President under the flexible provisions will be hampered at the outset by litigation, but the taciff commission seems disposed to ma'te little attempt to operate under the flexible provisions for some months until it has larger appropriations. High tariff men in Congress want to see the commission do as little as possible and hope the flexible tariff will prove a disappointment to the country and will be eventually knocked out by the courts. Altogether, there are many obstacles in the way of the flexible or elastic tariff and this point eems to point more clearly than night otherwise be the case to another revision of the tariff by Con-
