THE REASON WHY THE GREEK CABINET RESIGNED.
ATHENS, March 8. The determined opposition of the Republicans and Militarists to the policy of the Government with regard to the Greek dynasty is given as the reason for the resignation of the Cabinet. The Militarists for some time have been trying to force the hand of the Government on the question of Greece's future regime and this has placed it in a difficult position. There is a possibility of the formation of a Coalition or purely Republican Cabinet, but some doubts are expressed whether a Republican Ministry would gain the confidence of the National Assembly.

Meeting of Lawyers in London
OTTAWA, Ont., March 8.—(C.P.)—The impression that the meeting of lawyers in July next in London, England, will assume the complexion of an international event seems to obtain as strongly on this side of the water as in England. Some of the most distinguished members of the American and Canadian Bench and Bar will be present. It is expected that unity of national ideals and aspirations for the future well-being of the English-speaking world will be stressed at the meeting, rather than any deliberate attempts will be made to refashion the foundations of international law. American law periodicals are urging participation in the event and one of great importance from the international point of view, and the profession in Canada distinctly holds to that idea.

TURKEY GONE RED.
LONDON, March 9. Little political importance is attached by the British press to the abolition by the Kemalists of the Caliphate, so far as Great Britain is directly concerned, though it is expected to knock the bottom out of the Khalifat agitation in India which reunited Hindu and Moslem in common discontent. The effect of the Kemalists' move in Turkey, however, is quite a different matter. It is generally anticipated here that this action by her national extremists will considerably weaken her position and prestige in the world, removing the last ground of her claim to rank as a great power. The Daily Telegraph terms the action of Ankara as the most astonishing act of suicide and recklessness in the history of modern times, and declares the position of the Indian Moslems in regard to the Caliphate is intolerable. 175 MINERS ENTOMBED.
SALT LAKE CITY, Mich., March 8. Approximately 175 coal miners are entombed as a result of an explosion this morning in number two mine at the Utah Fuel Company at Caspate, Utah.

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CREW HAD TAKEN TO THE BOATS.
NEW YORK, March 8. The Spanish-American Line steamship Kungsholm has reported by wireless that the steamship Obernai, 388 tons, had sunk 80 miles east of Scattered Island and that the crew had taken to the boats. No details were contained in the wireless report which said that the Kungsholm expected to reach the boats from the Obernai at 9 p.m., to-night, and would take the crew to Halifax.

BEING TAKEN TO MALIFAX.
HALIFAX, March 9. The crew of the steamer Obernai, which sank off Cape Breton yesterday, is safe aboard the Swedish steamer Kungsholm, bound for Halifax. The Kungsholm should reach port late to-night but will not dock until to-morrow morning.

One Hundred Thousand Cases a Month

SMUGGLED INTO THE UNITED STATES BY RUM RUNNERS.

WASHINGTON, March 2.—One hundred thousand cases of liquor a month are smuggled into the United States by rum runners, off the Atlantic and Gulf coasts, according to coastguard officials charged with preventing the traffic. This estimate was given to the House appropriations sub-committee which drafted the deficiency bill reported yesterday allocating an additional \$13,833,999 for the coastguard service. In testimony before the sub-committee February 25 Commander Root, who had made a special investigation of rum running activities, said:

"The smugglers' high sea forces at present consists of 234 steamers and 123 sailing vessels ranging in size from 35 to 35,000 tons. Some of these vessels are capable of speeds up to 19 knots. The majority fly foreign flags. The auxiliary crafts for making shore contact consist of several hundred gasoline driven craft, about 20 per cent of which are capable of 15 knots.

"We have captured the equivalent of 31,000 cases of liquor and caused to be jettisoned under fire an amount estimated at 20,000 cases. The so-called 'rum row' off New York is maintained ostensibly as a good business proposition but principally as a diversion to hold to that point the attention of as many coastguard vessels as possible."

Commander Root said the smugglers maintained advance stations at St. John's, Nfld., St. Pierre, Micoudon, the Azores, Bermuda and the Bahamas.

"The smugglers maintained a bribery fund," he added, "and have shore organizations for obtaining supplies and making contacts."

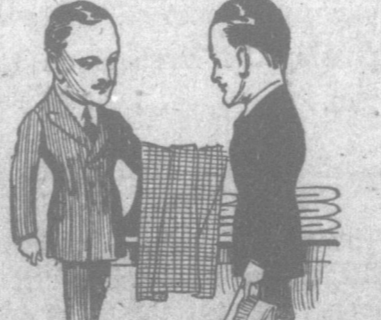
Commander Root said a report from Havana showed that from 7,000 to 10,000 cases of liquor were shipped weekly to Baltimore and New York concealed in cargoes of sugar. Extensive smuggling activities also exist in the Puget Sound country, he added, and:

"Not only is the traffic increasing but also the audacity, skill and courage of the enemy."
