More Victories and More Gains.
Twelve elections took place on Friday, and only one went against the Opposition. North Perth, a strong Conservative Riding, elected the well-known Tom Daly, who, in old times, used to do all the dirty work for John A. Macdonald, and who will, doubtless, do it again. He will fill Tom Ferguson's shoes exactly. We regret Mr. Redford's defeat. He made a gallant fight in 1867, but the Riding went against him this time; but the fact that Daly's majority is only 64 is a good proof that the Reform candidate is still very popular.

In North Brant Mr. Fleming made a splendid fight, and beat his Dundreary opponent by a majority of 316, which is something unprecedented for that Riding. In South Perth also, Mr. Trow has been elected by a large majority. We scarcely expected this. The divisions in the Reform ranks somewhat weakened our strength, but at the last they united, and working hand in hand, secured Trow's election by a majority of 300.

South and Centre Huron more than realized the expectations of Reformers. In Centre Huron it was one Reformer against another; but Mr. Horton, the nominee of the Reform Convention, beat Mr. White head, the old member, by a majority of 490. In South Huron, Mr. M. C. Cameron gallantly defeated the Conservative candidate. This Riding was so fixed and cut out, that John A. felt sure that it would elect a supporter of his Government, but Mr. Cameron stepped into the breach, and gallantly rescued it from the hands of the Tories.

In North Renfrew Mr. Findlay has won the victory by hard work. In South Leeds Mr. Richards whipped the Conservative candidate by a small majority. In Prince Edward Mr. Ross has beaten McCuaig. In Muskoka Mr. Cockburn has beaten Dr. Arcy Boulton. In Glengarry Mr. D. A. Macdonald had the immense majority of 1,100. In St. Hyacinthe, Quebec, the Liberal candidate was elected, and in North Middlesex and North Oxford Messrs. Scatcherd and Oliver were elected by acclamation. The gains in Ontario of the Opposition are now 18 and their losses 3, giving a net increase of 15, or 80 upon a division. The Opposition returns now number 41 in Ontario. The Ministry have 27, and there are 3 Independent.

ELECTION NEWS.
Mr. Paterson's actual majority in South Brant is 272. Hincks' majority in Brantford—the only municipality where he came out ahead—was 70.
Sir Francis Hincks seems to have abandoned himself to a state of utter despondency since he was taught so severe a lesson in South Brant. He remains in a state of retirement at the Rossin House, scarcely admitting a friend to console with him.
The Hon. J. H. Cameron, so thoroughly defeated in Peel, has sought refuge in Cardwell, a county carved out for the especial benefit of defeated Tories. But even John Hillyard Cameron was afraid to face the music alone in Cardwell, and had to take the notorious Dr. Tupper with him to the nomination, to speak in his behalf.
The Mail says that Sir Francis Hincks went East on Friday night with the intention of meeting his family at Riviere du Loup, and will be in Ottawa in time to attend the meetings of the Cabinet when the members of the Government assemble there when the elections are concluded. We should judge from this that Sir Francis won't try to get elected.

After several gentlemen had been nominated, and many eloquent speeches delivered, all the nominees withdrew except Mr. D. Thompson, the former member, whom the Returning Officer declared elected by acclamation.
