ANNUAL DRILL. It being considered inexpedient to form camps of instruction for the annual training of the Active Militia during the financial year of 1873-4, the drill of all corps carried out at the local headquarters of the corps, under supervision of the officer commanding the corps, at such times between the 1st July, 1873, and the 30th of June, 1874, as may be most consistent for the officers and men resident in any city, belonging to a brigade of artillery or battalion of infantry. The headquarters of which are within such city are to per-form drill by companies or in a brigade, or battalion, or part in a battery or com pany, and part in a brigade or battalion as may be directed by the officers com-manding such brigades or battalions Rural corps attached for administrative purposes to city brigades of artillery, or battalions of infantry, are to perform the annual drills at their battery or company's headquarters, except in cases where, from proximity to the city, it may be more convenient for the battery or company to drill with the brigade or batthan 3 hours during each of the 16 days, to be performed. The drill for all troops of cavalry will be carried out by the officers commanding, and the mode of forming the advanced and rear guards practiced as laid down in the cavalry regulations; also, the mode of a special control of the cavalry regulations; also, the mode of the cavalry regulations are called the cavalry regulations. practiced as laid down in the cavalry regulations; also, the mode of extending mounted skirmishers, and in firin with blank ammunition when mounted whenever circumstances will admit. Th necessary instruction for the cavalry corps is detailed in the cavalry drill book of the 1st of August, 1899, and in addition to the introductory remarks contained attention will be paid to section, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, and 7, comprising military equitation. Cavalry target practice to at 200 and 400 yards range; the drill for the artilley corps to consist of gun drill and such other regimental artillery exercises as may be deemed most essential and fitting. Officers communiting field batteries, should select the most simple and useful of the movements laid down in the manual of field artillery exercises. The drivers will be instructed in driving, cleaning harness, etc., the gunners in gun drill, dismounting and mounting guns, righting guns which have been upset, changing wheels, removing disabled field artillery, etc. Where facilities oxist officers commanding field batteries should practice those under their command in action. necessary instruction for the cavalr

omeers commanding held batteries should practice those under their command in throwing up cover for guns in action, moving guns and horse over falls, ditches, ravines, small streams or other obstacles, and, without adhering to strict rules, endeavor to stimulate the ingenuity and the interest of all concerned. On the conclusion of the training of field batteries, all harness, saddlery, carriages, waggons and small stores will be replaced in the sheds in a perfectly clean state, and fit for immediate service. The drivers cleaning the harness. The gunners the guns and waggons. Officers commanding batteries, will be held responsible at any time when their batteries are suddenly ordered out, that the service ammunition and other necessary stores are complete and in good order.

For infantry corps: squad, company and battalion drill, including the manual and platone exercises, estimishing and rifle instruction—two days to be occupied in squad drill, four days in company drill, two days in theoretical rifle instruction, four days in target practice, and four days in skirmishing drill.

The annual course of rifle instruction and target practice for the Infantry is to be considered of primary importance as a military exercise, the noncommissioned officers and men of all corps armed with the Sniter rifle will fire ten rounds each at the distance of two, four, five and six hundred yards respectively. At the conclusion of the training, the shooting figures, together with the names of the best shots in every company, battalion, corps and brigade, will be rendered to the Adjatant-General's head quarters by the Deputy Adjatant-General's head quarters by the Deputy Adjatant-General seammand general inspection of such corps made by the Pistret Staff Officers, and and and half hours each; the pay for horses will be and officers and and horses will be and followed at the rate of seventy-five cents, of the pay for horses will be and lowed at the rate of seventy-five cents per herse for each drill of three hours each, of the respo


