INTERESTING TO THOSE CONNECTED WITH RAILWAYS.—At a recent meeting of the railroad managers of the United States and Canada, held in Chicago, the fact was stated that an agreement had been entered into, whereby the Companies would in the future refuse in every interesting any indemnity to employees for entered into, whereby the Companies would in the future refuse in every instance any indemnity to employees for injuries on their roads, and also to cut off all pensioners. In pursuance of this arrangement, the Michigan Central Railroad Company has notified all its employees that the Company will not guarantee them against injury, nor agree to pay their bills, or s.pport them or their families in case of casualty. All are given distinctly to understand that the company will pay its working men only the wages agreed upon, and that they must assume all risks attendant upon the business themselves.

The reasons given for this step are that the net gains of the railroads are now so small that they cannot afford this burden, as heretofore. Besides, it is alleged that accident insurance companies of perfect responsibility will undertake for a small risk, to indemnify all insurers against injury. Other lines will most likely ere long be following in the wake of the Michigan Central in this matter.
