TORONTO, March 3.—In the Legislative Assembly to-day Mr. Mowat's bill to amend the act respecting mortmain and charitable uses was amended by providing that the bill should not be construed to take away any rights now possessed by any corporation and that the court should agt in a summary manner so as to avoid expense, the bill then passed the committee.

The bill to incorporate the Association of Ontario Land Surveyors was next taken up. Mr. Hardy said that the surveyors had considered some of the objections made to the bill, and were willing to allow certain changes, namely to drop the clause establishing fees for professional services in connection with surveying, reducing the fee of each applicant deriving a certificate to practice to \$30, provided the annual legislative grant of \$400 to the association was continued. The bill was amended accordingly. The section which provides for the dismissal or suspension of members guilty of gross negligence or corruption was allowed to stand, Mr. Meredith objectcordingly. The committee then rose and reported progress. A deputation from the Dominion Grange, consisting of Messrs. Peter Hepinstall (master), Robert Wilkie (secretary), H. Glendinning and J. They hoped that the amendments to the drainage laws would reduce the cost of the operation, and that the usefulness of the Ditches and Water Courses Act would be restored by the removal of the 50-rod limit which was added a few years ago.

CRIME IN THE COUNTY.

Some Interesting Particulars About the Jail in London.

The Number of Boarders Lodged There Last Year-What They Cost Individually and Collectively-Their National and Religious Classifications-The Inspector's Report.

During the official year of 1891 Governor Kelly had 579 boarders at the large struc-ture on the southwest corner of Ridout and Dundas streets, commonly known as the

ture on the southwest corner of Ridout and Dundas streets, commonly known as the county iail.

His patronage shows a decrease compared with former years. In 1890 there were 754 prisoners committed, and in 1889, 1,042. Of last year's lodgers 476 were males and 103 females. Twenty-two were boys under 16 and two were girls also under that age.

The cost of maintaining the county jail for the year was \$7,305 80, against \$5,939 30 in 1890. Of this amount \$3,076.25 was paid out for food, fuel and clothing The average cost for each prisoner, including these three items, was therefore \$12.61 a year, or 33.80 cents per day. It cost only 6.3-10 cents per diem for each prisoner's rations. The salaries of the officials total \$3,493.34.

Of these 579 prisoners, 344 vere in for the first time, 118 for the second, 51 for the third, and 66 old-timers made their fourth visit or over—the twentieth for some of them. Two hundred and twenty-three were acquitted on trial and discharged; 69 were discharged without trial. Out of the remaining 216, who were found guilty and sentenced, 101 got off with 30 days and less, four were sent down for between two and three years in the penitentiary, eight for over three years in the penitentiary and eight to the Reformatory for Boys. The remainder got monthly sentences, 28 going to the Central Prison.

Nationally last year's prisoners were classified as follows: Canadians, 290; English, 101; Irish, 117; Sectch, 31; United States, 27, and other countries, 13. Their religious denominations are put down as follows: Church of England, 177; Roman Catholics, 177; Presbyterians, 128; Methodists, 63; other denominations, 34. Two hundred were married, 379 were unmarried; \$4 could neither read nor write; 267 were temperate; and 312 were intemperate. The number committed for drunkenness was 213, a large decrease compared with 1890.
