

A PARTING GIFT.

Mr. Atwell Fleming Presented With a Silver Water Pitcher by Court Vic-toria, No. 10, I. O. F.—He Resigns the Office of Treasurer of that Court.

Last evening Court Victoria, No. 10,

I. O. F., held a special meeting in their

hall, Albion Block. The object of the gathering turned out to be for the purpose of receiving a visit from Mr. Atwell Fleming, the court treasurer, and high treasurer of Ontario, who had been in Toronto for a month past. A large number of members from other city courts attended. When the general business of the court was reached Mr. Fleming rose, and in a brief speech related his efforts in behalf of Forestry since his connection with the order. His object, he stated, in visiting them, was to resign the office of treasurer of the court. He had but recently located in Toronto, resigning his position as superintendent of the "Advertiser" job department to accept a position in Toronto. His services for fourteen years as treasurer he had given simply as a matter of duty, and he would always cherish in his memory the many pleasant events that transpired during his term of office. When he first took office the court was heavily in debt. This had been overcome, and the court was now in a prosperous condition. In relinquishing this post he also resigned as treasurer of the hall board. In closing he wished all city members and those of Court Victoria success, stating that as long as he thought it to be justice to himself he would remain a member of Court Victoria, No. 10. Bro. Hunter and Thomas Cousins stepped forward and read the following address, which was accompanied with a silver water pitcher of excelent workmanship:

An exchange declares that sponges are not as a rule carefully enough clean ed, and that they are when dirty very liable to propagate microbes. After use a sponge should always be rinsed in clean hot water in which a liberal pinch of borax has been dissolved, well squeezed and then dried in the sunshine or hanging it up where the air can freely circulate about it. Sponges should never be left in a bag when wet. Sliminess may be removed by soaking for 24 hours in a couple of pints of hot water in which an ounce of carbonate of soda—ordinary washing soda—has been dissolved. Sponges in constant use, especially small face sponges, swarm with bacteria, and on that account should be thrown away or used for some household cleaning purpose
