# A PREY TO FLAMES.

Hamilton's Summer Hotel at the Fourteenth Fatality Resulting From the Beach in Ashes.

Destruction of an Old Landmark at Blue Bonnets-Harwick

Hotel Taxes.-Can a licensed or summer hotel avoid paying taxes on onethird of what the hotel cost because those who run it lose money every year? Ans.-The council could not legally remit any part of the taxes on such ground. The assessment, however, should be fixed not at the cost of the hotel but at what it is fairly worth, and it might be legally assessed at onethird less than its cost if the facts justified such an assessment in the opinion of the assessors, the court of

revision or the county court judge. Kingsville.-Can H compel the village council to put a water main on his street, which was not shown on the plan when a vote of the electors was taken to have waterworks put in town? Ans.-If he requires to use the water he can compel the corporation to furnish it to him, and to put in a main if necessary for the purpose of doing so. 2. Can H get out of paying his water rate by not being in reach of water mains? Ans.—No; he must pay the general water rates, but he does not pay water rent unless he uses the water. The term water rate is strictly applicable to the rate to pay the debentures for the construction but is commonly used to denote the rent payable by the users of the water, which rent is applicable to the maintenance of the waterworks in the first instance, and the surplus goes to the general funds of the corporation.

Sombra.-To whom are saloon licenses paid, and to what is the revenue derived therefrom appropriated? Does any portion go to the support of the Dominion Government or the Provincial Government? Ans.-The duties rayable for liquor licenses are paid to the Provincial Treasurer, i.e., paid into his book to his credit under the direction of the license inspector. All sums in any district received for the li-cense fund for that district, out of which are first paid the expenses of the board and inspector in carrying out the provisions of the Liquor License Act, and the residue on June 30 each year is paid over, one-third to the Treasurer of the Province, and two-thirds to the treasurer of the local municipality in which the duties were first collected. No part goes to the Dominion Government, and the part which goes to the Province is applied in defraying the expense of the License Department in Toronto and the

Village Council.-The council passed a resolution not to spend any more money this year on a certain kind of This work would benefit certain individuals, but it is not for the benefit of the corporation as a whole. A special was called and one of the council was coaxed into voting to rescind the resolution and to vote for the work for which the council has no funds, and have to borrow money to do it. Can the council legally do this? Ans. -The action of the council seems to be irregular, but it is not illegal. The work, of course, must be public work, although it may not benefit more than a portion of the corporation, and the council must provide the funds by taxation during the current year. The council may legally borrow money for current expenditure until the taxes are collected. If the expenditure is on private property, or if funds are not le-gally provided for the purpose, the council could be restrained by injunction from the High Court. Unless the matter is very important it would not be wise to apply to the court when decisions do not strictly require municipal councils to exercise their power

FRIGHTENING CHILDREN.

It Is Cruel and Wicked, and Produces Bad Consequences.

(Prof. James Sully, in Popular Science Monthly.) Happy those little ones who have ever near them loving arms within whose magic circle the oncoming of the cruel fit of terror is instantly checked, giving place to a delicious calm.

How unhappy those children must be who, timid and fearsome by nature, lack this refuge—who are left much alone to wrestle with their horrors as best they may, and are rudely repulsed when they bear their heartquakings to others-I would not venture to say. Still less would I care to suggest what is suffered by those unfortunates who find in those about them not comfort, assurance, support in their fearsome moments, but the worst source of terror. To be brutal to these small, sensitive organisms, to practice on their terrors, to take delight in exciting the wild stare and the wilder shriek of terror, this is perhaps one of the strange things which make one believe in the old dogma that the devil can enter into men and women. For here we seem to have to do with a form of cruelty so exquisite, so contrary to the oldest of instincts, that it is dishonoring to the

savage and to the lower animals to attempt to refer it to heredity. To dwell on such things, however, would be to go back to a pessimistic view of childhood. It is undeniable that children are exposed to indescribable nisery when they are delivered into the hands of a consummatery cruel mother or nurse. Yet one may hope that this sort of person is exceptionalsomething of which we can give no account save by saying that now and again in sport nature produces a monster, as if to show what she cou'd do if she did not choose more wisely and
