Bismarck Going to Berlin.

BERLIN, Jan. 23.—Both the press and
the public are engrossed with the subject
of Bismarck's coming visit to Berlin. The
North German Gazette says that the invita-tion to Bismarck was made entirely on
the Emperor's initiative in continuation of
the advances begun last summer at Gasteau,
and that the visit has no immediate political
meaning.

Russia and the Vatican.

ROME, Jan. 23.—An accord between the
Vatican and Russia in ecclesiastical
questions has been arranged, the Russian
envoy, M. Isoulski, having received orders
to observe a conciliatory attitude in the
negotiations to effect that end.

The Khedive to Visit England.

LONDON, Jan. 23.—Arrangements now
making for the reception of the Khedive
of Egypt show that his visit to England is
regarded as an important political event.
He will be accompanied by two of his Min-
isters, will reside in Buckingham Palace,
and will be entertained with gala performances
at Covent Garden.

Ada Rehan Captures London.

LONDON, Jan. 23.—Augustine Daly, the
theater manager, was interviewed yester-
day concerning the report that he will
bring his London season to a premature
close. He said that he never had the in-
tention of shortening Ada Rehan's stay
here. Now that her Viola in Shakespeare's
"Twelfth Night" had become the only
positive sensation of the season, he was more
likely to prolong his season than shorten
it. His season would certainly last until
May, when Eleonora Duse would begin a
six weeks' engagement. After Duse, Sarah
Bernhardt would begin her engagement.
"This season covers 40 weeks," continued
Mr. Daly, "with twelve weeks between
Duse and Bernhardt. That does not indicate
failure. The fact is that my theater has
become a house of the highest class at
less labor and expense than is required to
make a Fifth Avenue success. My com-
pany will open in Chicago next September,
and in New York next November."The Canada-Australia Steamship
Service.LONDON, Jan. 23.—The Marquis of Ripon,
Secretary of State for the Colonies, yester-
day received an influential deputation, who
urged the Imperial Government to subsidize
the Canada-Australia steamship service
to the extent of £25,000 yearly for
ten years, in order that the service might
be sustained. If this were done assurances
were given that the company would
undertake to build another steamship,
which would be available as
an armored cruiser in time of war. The
company would also undertake that all
future steamers would be similarly built.
It was urged that the Government would
save by granting this subsidy as the de-
crease in the subsidies hereafter paid via
the Suez Canal route would be greater than
the subsidy asked for by the Canada-
Australia line. The importance of the
route to mail, passengers and trade, and
also to the Admiralty, and for communica-
tion with the Fiji Islands was pointed out.
Without an Imperial subsidy of £25,000
the company could not comply with the
Admiralty conditions, as such steamers as
are used in the service cost £200,000 each.The Marquis of Ripon promised the
deputation to give the matter his
consideration and bring it before the Cabinet.
The British Postmaster-General, the Rt.
Hon. Arnold Morley, has recognized the
route, and has given instructions that
"Australia letters marked 'via Canada'"
be sent by it in future. In making
this announcement the Postmaster-General
has the imperative need of the mail
service and of long-promised fast Atlantic
vessels.

Money for the British Navy.

LONDON, Jan. 24.—The naval estimates
for 1894 will provide for the expenditure
of £7,000,000. The decision to spend this
amount of money in strengthening the
navy is a great triumph for the lords of
the Admiralty, who insisted that it was
necessary to expend this amount of money
upon new ships.

Balfour's Significant Address.

LONDON, Jan. 24.—Arthur J. Balfour,
leader of the Unionists in the House of
Commons, spoke at length before a meeting
in Manchester on the subject of imperial
defense. Any nation or combination of
nations, he said, which was able to wrest
from Great Britain her supremacy of the
 seas could bring her to her knees without
landing a single soldier on English soil. He
did not believe any government was justi-
fied in expecting a longer era of peace. The
French and Russian Governments were
pushing forward with all speed in their
dockyards. Certain movements made of
late years in Asia were only too
obviously directed against England. While
there were indications that France and
Russia were earnestly bent upon peace,
their main arrangements evidently were
prompted by the assumption of conflictwith England, sooner or later, singly or
combined. He believed that the English
people were amicably disposed toward
France, but must admit, with the deepest
regret, the conviction that the French were
hostile to England. Finally Mr. Balfour
appealed to the electors to influence their
representatives in Parliament by all possible
means to assist in quickly and efficiently
strengthening the country's defenses. He
could pledge the Opposition, he said, to
co-operate cordially with the Government
in its every effort to increase England's
naval and military power.

A Panic in Calcutta.

LONDON, Jan. 24.—A dispatch from Cal-
cutta says there was another very heavy
fall in exchange to-day, the condition of
the money market being almost one of
panic.It is feared that Secretary of State Kim-
berley may accept any rate which is offered
at the next sale of the council bills. The
state of balances of the Presidency Banks
makes it practically certain that Secretary
Kimberley can command fair rates if he
only holds out for a week or so longer, but
the fear that he may surrender is crippling
all business. A dispatch from Hong Kong
says the break-down of the Indian Govern-
ment, in attempting to maintain a fictitious
rate of exchange, while leaving the future
as uncertain as before, has had the worst
possible effect. Business in Shanghai and
Hong Kong is paralyzed.

CAME BACK TO HELL OF HEAVEN.

The Strange Story of Pasco Hodges is
Believed by His Friends.RALEIGH, N. C., Jan. 24.—Many persons
in Wilmington believe that Pasco Hodges
died and came to life again for the purpose
of telling his friends that heaven and hell
were realities. Before falling ill he was an
atheist, as were many of his old friends.
They did not believe there was a God, a
heaven or a hell. His views changed, how-
ever, on his deathbed, and on Friday he
was baptized by Father Scullion of the
Catholic Church, and ordered his atheistic
books to be burned.On Saturday he became unconscious, and
the physicians, seeing that the end had
come, requested his wife to leave the room.
Soon afterwards he sat up in bed, called his
wife and, taking her in his arms, said he
had died, but she had brought him to life
by her distress. Then to the startled group
of atheistic friends, who had by this time
collected around him, he said impressively:
"There is a hell; there is a heaven; I have
seen both."Then he described both, and saying that
Jesus was waiting for him and he must go,
bade his wife farewell, placed his hands in
attitude of prayer, became unconscious and
remained so until the end. Those around
who had professed unbelief trembled and
wept bitterly.

TALMAGE IS FIRMLY.

His Resignation Final—Has Given \$50,000
to the Church.NEW YORK, Jan. 24.—Dr. Talmage gave
out this typewritten statement for the
press yesterday:"No organization could be turned to the
ground twice and compelled to build three
great buildings without being embarrassed.
But I feel as though I had done my share
toward lifting the debt. I have given to
the church in cash and free services \$50,000.
I don't say this in a spirit of boasting,
but in explanation.""This resignation is final. Twenty-five
years is a long period. I know but three
pastors in Brooklyn who have been here as
long. John Wesley was as wise a man as
ever lived. He said to years was long
enough. The Methodist place the limit at
five years.""I will preach on until my 25th anniver-
sary, whether in March or April I know
not, as I began to preach in Brooklyn
several weeks before being installed, and
have since celebrated my anniversary upon
both dates.""As to myself, I never was in better
health than now. I have missed but two
Sabbaths in the last 25 years. I started
with quite a delicate physical organization,
but as the years went on my physical vigor
increased. I can now walk and run further
than I could at 25 years of age. God only
knows the future, but I feel that my best
work is to come. My prevailing emotion is
gratitude to God and everybody."

FREE SUGAR!

The Action of Congress Causes a Sensa-
tion on Wall Street.WASHINGTON, Jan. 23.—The House to-
day voted to put sugar on the free list.WASHINGTON, Jan. 23.—The sense of the
House in the matter of free sugar was again
made manifest when the amendment offered
by Mr. Warner (Democrat, New York),
putting refined sugar on the free list, was
reaffirmed, while Mr. Robertson's (Demo-
crat, Louisiana), amendment, putting a tax
on sugar, was defeated, thus leaving all
sugar free.The greater part of the day was given
up to a consideration of the free coal
schedule. The amendments were all de-
feated.NEW YORK, N. Y., Jan. 23.—The action
of the House of Representatives on the
sugar schedule of the Wilson bill made the
sensation of the day in American sugar on
the Stock Exchange. One hundred and
fifty-three thousand certificates were sold,
and the decline for the day was $\frac{1}{4}$, though
at one time the quotation was down to $\frac{1}{8}$.
The market was fairly steady at the close.

Association, consisting of employers only,
met and decided to hang cards in their
offices announcing that hereafter the
offices will be open to every man,
whether a member of the union or not.This will result in a general walk-out of
the printers. Every job printing office in
the city, except that of the Democrat,
belongs to the association.

IN SECRET SESSION.

Doings of the P. P. A. Convention
at Hamilton.Delegates Under Began Names—London-
ers There—The Employment of
Catholics—Margaret L.
on DeckHAMILTON, Jan. 24.—The convention of
the "Protestant Protective Association" is
doing its secret work here. Many of the
delegates are staying at private houses,
and those who have filled the hotels are
registered in scores of instances under
false names. A prominent London citizen
is entered on the register as having from
Cambridge; half a dozen Toronto delegates
claim Milliken's Corners as their home.
Guelph delegates are proud to be natives
of Norval, and St. Thomas citizens
hide their identity under the assumption
that they are from Glencoe.London, St. Catharines, Orangeville, Bran-
ford, Windsor and Woodstock are among
the places well represented, according to
the hotel registers. This source of informa-
tion, however, is not entirely reliable. The
attendance does not include many well-
known men. The prominence of the grand
president, J. H. McConnell, of Windsor,
and Grand Secretary Jackson Little, of
Toronto, in connection with the order
itself. Among others are Mayor Bessy,
of London; Rev. William McDonagh,
Exeter; Rev. William Hayhurst, Forest,
and Rev. V. A. Wright, Brantford, who
were among the clergymen present."Jumbo" Campbell, of Queen's Park (To-

A NEW SHEPHERD.

Rev. R. Robertson Formally Takes
Charge of His Flock.Induction Services at King Street Pres-
byterian Church—The Y. F. S. C. E.
Greet Their New Pastor in
a Pleasant Manner.The induction services of the Rev. R.
Robertson to the pastorate of the King
Street Presbyterian Church were held last
night. Mr. Robertson has for a few years
past been assistant pastor to the Rev.
Mungo Fraser in Knox Church, Hamilton,
and comes highly recommended as an ear-
nest, diligent and faithful worker. And
to welcome this new pastor to the city of
London, and particularly to the church of
which he is to take charge, a large number
of the members and adherents assembled
last night. The building was filled to its
utmost capacity, the proceedings
throughout being of a very interesting
nature. The clergymen on the platform
were: Revs. Jas. Ballantyne (moderator
of the London Presbytery), J. A. Murray,
W. J. Clark, James Gordon, E. Sawers
(Westminster), J. S. R. Burnett, Alex.
Henderson (Glencoe), Webb (Delaware),
and Rev. Joseph Philip (pastor of the
Centennial Methodist Church).Rev. J. S. R. Burnett occupied the pul-
pit, and preached an impressive sermon,
taking as his text I. Corinthians, ii., 2:
"For I determined not to know anything
among you save Jesus Christ and him
crucified." Throughout the entire dis-
course the reverend gentleman was listened
to with the most intense interest. Mr.
Burnett has a very simple manner of de-
livery and an easy flow of language, and it
is safe to say that his sermon was a treat
rarely enjoyed. He dwelt chiefly on the
great work performed by the Apostle Paul,
and drew his remarks to a close with an
earnest appeal to the parents to train their
children in their daily life to love the
Master.On behalf of the London Presbytery,
Rev. Alex. Henderson, of Glencoe, con-
gratulated the congregation upon the
speedy settlement that had been arrived at,
and especially upon the good success at-
tending them in securing a pastor such as
Mr. Robertson.Rev. Mr. Henderson then put the usual
questions to Mr. Robertson, and all being
answered in a satisfactory manner the new
pastor knelt, and Mr. Henderson led in
prayer. The addresses to the minister and
congregation followed.Rev. J. A. Murray, in addressing Mr.
Robertson, spoke of the duties of a pastor
to his congregation in a very impressive
manner. It would, he said, take a life-
time to attempt to learn the various duties
devolving upon a minister, and when the
three score years and ten were spent it
would then be found that he had only begun
to learn.Rev. James Gordon, a pioneer Presby-
terian minister of the city, and one who
took active steps to start the London East
congregation, was called upon to address
the people. He laid down the duties of the
congregation in regard to the assistance
they should render to their pastor, urging
them to labor diligently and with a will to
forward everything undertaken.At the conclusion of Mr. Gordon's ad-
dress Rev. Jas. Ballantyne stepped forward
and addressed Mr. Robertson. He said
that he had been requested by the Y. F. S.
C. E. and several members of the church to
present him with a handsome Bible and
Psalter. He was very glad to give this ex-
