Province for the last twelve months.

self, or you may be without a vote in the
coming elections.

—Miss Laura McNeil, St. Catharines, is

niversary supper and entertainment on
Monday evening ex-Mayor Spencer will
preside as chairman, Dr. Antliff will de-
liver an address, and a splendid musical
programme will be carried through by

A number of Stratfordites and London-
ers spent last Monday night on the G.
T. R. train which stuck in a snow bank at
Kelly's siding on its way from here to
Stratford. A foraging party set out for the
nearest farm house—Mr. Pardee's—and
secured a stock of provisions for the pas-
sengers. They then proceeded to spend a
comfortable night. The ladies organized a
progressive refreshment party to while away the
hours, and these fortunate enough to get
into this inner circle say that they never
had more fun under such trying circum-
stances. In the meantime the train men
were kept busy melting snow to provide
water for the boiler so that steam could be

The will of the late Annie Pixley has
been filed for probate in Philadelphia.
After directing that her debts and funeral
expenses be fully satisfied, she left all her
estate, real and personal, to her husband,
Robert Fulford. In the event of her hus-
band dying first Miss Pixley had willed
that her property be distributed among her
relatives and to charitable institutions. By
this Miss Edith Fraser, of Port Stanley,
her niece, would have received \$6,000 in
trust until her death or marriage, when the
principal would have reverted to the res-
tiduary estate.

THE DOMINION SAVINGS AND INVESTMENT SOCIETY.

Annual Meeting.

The annual meeting of the society was
held on Tuesday, Feb. 13, at their offices,
Richmond street, London, at 11 o'clock
a.m.

There were present: Robert Reid,
Esq., president, in the chair, T. H. Pur-
dom acting as secretary; Dr. Moorehouse,
John Ferguson, J. A. Blair, M. J. Kent,
Richard Thompson, George Porter (Bow-
manville), Dr. J. W. McLaughlin (Bow-
manville), W. J. McMurry (Toronto), E.
R. Levy, Francis Love, James Campbell,
W. M. Spencer, C. R. Somerville, John
Purdum, Thomas Kent, Dr. Arnot, Joshua
Jackson, W. J. Craig, Alexander Purdom,
E. J. Parke, Q. C., John Johnston, Samuel
Wright, Rev. J. R. Gundy, Rebecca Cad-
ham, C. W. Cadham, John Dearness, Geo.
Moncrieff, M. P., Mrs. Laura Howell, A.

The minutes of the last meeting were
read and confirmed.

The secretary read the report as follows:
To the shareholders of the Dominion Savings
and Investment Society:

The directors beg leave to submit the
21st annual report of the affairs of the
Society.

The net earnings during the year
amounted to \$66,097.41, from which two
half-yearly dividends at the rate of 6 per
cent. per annum, amounting to \$55,960.69,
have been paid, and the balance, \$10,136.72,
carried to the contingent account.

The directors regard the business of the
year on the whole satisfactory, and, al-
though the general depression in the
value of real estate has prevented the con-
version of property on hand into cash as
speedily as the directors desired, it has not
prevented them from disposing of some of
the properties, and all ascertained losses
have been written off the contingent ac-
count created some years ago for that pur-
pose, still leaving at the credit of that ac-
count the sum of \$22,272.72.

During the year the society redeemed
debentures of the Ontario Investment As-
sociation assumed by it amounting to \$214,-
620.

Following the advice of his physician,
the manager, Mr. H. E. Nelles, went to
Southern California for the benefit of his
health. The directors regret this very
much, as Mr. Nelles has proved himself to be
a careful and thoroughly competent
manager. They hope he will soon be able
to resume his duties. During his absence
Mr. T. H. Purdom, the inspecting director,
assumed increased responsibility, and the
business of the society suffered as little in-
convenience as possible.

The books of the society have been each
month regularly audited by Messrs. C. R.
Somerville and J. K. McDermid, with the
result which appears by their certificate
attached to the statement.

The society's business is still confined
to Western Ontario.

All the directors retire annually, but are
eligible for re-election.
