Elected Moderator.

Sympathetic Resolution Anent the
Death of Rev. Lachlan Cameron.

Amounts Required by the Augmented
Charges—A Separate Congregation
Wanted at Ilderton—James
Munro's Appeal.

A meeting of the London Presbytery was held in the First Presbyterian Church, this city, yesterday, when a considerable amount of business was transacted. Rev. W. J. Clark was elected moderator of the Presbytery for the ensuing term. The following will be commissioners to the General Assembly to be held at St. John, N.B., in June, with several others to be added: Messrs. W. R. Sutherland, Dr. Proudfoot, Geo. Sutherland, E. H. Sawers, Dr. Ballantyne, ministers; Elders John Cameron, Neil McNeill, Charles H. Elliott, Malcolm Leitch, James Waterman and James Meek. A feeling resolution was passed in connection with the recent death of Rev. Lachlan Cameron, of Thamesford. The Presbytery recognized the high gifts of grace with which he was endowed. As a preacher of the word of God he was characterized with great earnestness for the salvation of souls and was very systematic and constant in his zeal and care for the families of his charge, and especially with reference to the sick and sorrowing of his flock. The Presbytery tendered the bereaved family their heartfelt sympathy. It was such deaths inspired them with the words "Blessed are the dead which die in the Lord from henceforth; yea, saith the Spirit, that they may rest from their labors; and their works do follow them."

Rev. Mr. Cook was appointed interim moderator, and obtained leave to moderate in a call if necessary.

A request was submitted from Chalmers' Church, Dunwich, that the minister be allowed to preach in Lawrence if he so desired. Left in the hands of the ministers at Dunwich and Fingal, the matter of salary to be determined by the congregation.

The session records at Thamesford, Ailsa Craig, Melbourne and Riverside were submitted for review and to be attested.

A petition from Ilderton was taken up. D. M. Rae, Robert Calvert, B. Charlton and Thomas Oliver were heard in favor of a separate organization, and W. A. Campbell, T. B. Scott and J. W. Robson, from the congregation of Vaneck opposed the petition. A committee composed of Rev. Mr. Curry, Rev. Mr. Murray, Rev. Mr. Ballantyne and Elder G. Young were appointed to attend to the matter and report.

Rev. Mr. Gordon read the report of the treasurer, which showed much careful preparation.

Rev. Mr. Henderson gave the report of the home mission and the amount to be asked from each of these augmented charges for the coming year, and likewise the amounts to be paid for the past half year as follows: Aylmer and Springfield, \$150 and \$75 for the past six months; Hyde Park and Komoka, \$150 and \$75; Alma Street, St. Thomas, \$150 and \$75; King Street, London, \$300 and \$81 for time of vacancy; Delaware and Caradoc, \$100—\$75 for Delaware and \$25 for Cook's Church, Caradoc, and \$75 for past six months; Port Stanley, \$200 and \$117, conditionally on all arrears for supply being freely paid up; Wardsville and Newbury, \$200 and \$104 on the same conditions; North Street and South Delaware, \$150 and \$52 on like conditions; North Ekfrid, \$3 per Sabbath asked for ensuing year.

Adjourned.

Provisional arrangements were made for the induction of Rev. Mr. Brown into the pastorate at Tempo, the date to be fixed later. Rev. Mr. Robertson will preside, Rev. Mr. Sawers will address the minister and Rev. Mr. McIntyre the people.

Application was made by Rev. Mr. Miller for leave to moderate in a call. Permission was granted, on condition that all pulpit supply be settled up to date.

A delegation from the Wardsville congregation was present and asked leave to dispose of some property. Granted.

Notice was read by the clerk stating that Mr. James Munro intended to take his petition to the Assembly. Rev. Messrs. Ballantyne, Henderson and Currie were appointed to represent the Presbytery in the matter.

The report on "Systematic Benevolence" was read by Rev. Mr. Sawers showing gratifying advances in its line.

Rev. Mr. Dewar gave a partial Sunday school report. The full report was laid over until the next regular meeting of the Presbytery.

A committee was appointed to consider the questions submitted by the General Assembly Sabbath school committee and also the expense which would be connected with the scheme of higher religious instruction. The report will be presented at the next meeting.

Presbytery adjourned at 10 o'clock to meet the following morning.
