We do not see how the winter wheat conditions in the April Government report can be under 95. This would indicate a crop of 515,000,000 bushels, against a crop last year of 367,000,000 bushels. There was a falling off in car lots in northwestern markets, and east end abattoir today. The wet weather did not prevent the butchers from coming out in large numbers, but the higher prices asked for the cattle caused a slow market. Prices were generally more than he per lb higher than on Thursday, prime begyes selling at about 5c per lb for not very choice animals. Medium cattle sold at from 3%c to near 14%c, and the common stock at from 2%c to 3½c per lb. Calves brought higher rates than at last week's market, selling at from \$2 to \$4 for young calves and from \$6 to \$8 for good veals. Sheep sold at 4c and lambs at about 5½c per lb. Fat hogs are advancing; good lots sold up to 7c per lb, weighed off the cars.
