The Madrid police are extremely reticent regarding the discovery of the anarchist plot. Several of the papers now question whether the arrested men really entertained the intentions attributed to them.

ANARCHIST PLOT TO KILL ALFONSO

Several Arrests in Connection With the Discovery.

SEQUEL TO SATURDAY'S SCARE

When a Crazy Man Attempted to Present a Paper to the King—Alfonso's First Proclamation.

Madrid, May 19.—An anarchist plot against King Alfonso has been discovered and six arrests in the matter, including that of Gabriel Lopez, an employee of an insurance company, have been made. Dynamite cartridges were found on the premises where Lopez was arrested.

Lopez says he received a package of cartridges from another anarchist with instructions.

The discovery of the plot against the king is confirmed by the newspapers here. It is now said that nine dynamite cartridges were seized.

The captured cartridges are being analyzed by the military authorities.

POLICE HAD WARNING.

According to the newspapers here the police had an inkling of the anarchist plot against the king since last March, and in April they discovered an anarchist meeting place in a fashionable quarter of Madrid. Three Andalusian anarchists arrived here May 2 and were arrested shortly after their arrival. After their arrest it was learned that a doorkeeper of an insurance company, which is situated in the Carrera San Gerónimo, on the route near the chamber of deputies, and a number of cartridges, believed to be of dynamite, in his possession. The man was arrested yesterday.

Gabriel Lopez, the doorkeeper, was examined before a magistrate, when he declared that the man who gave him the cartridges and told him to throw them into the royal coach, was Francisco Suarez. Suarez is notorious for the part he played in an attempted outrage under the late Canovas de Castillo seven years ago, when he accompanied an anarchist named Ruiz, who intended to explode a bomb in Canovas de Castillo's garden. The bomb exploded prematurely. Ruiz was killed and Suarez was badly injured. He was committed to prison for seven years, and has only recently been liberated. Lopez accused Suarez of giving him the dynamite cartridges. This Suarez denied, and both men are detained.

CARLIST MANIFESTO.

A copy of a Carlist manifesto, seized at Madrid, has reached Paris. It is signed "Your King, Carlos," and is directed against the "usurpation of the throne by the so-called Alfonso XIII."

The manifesto fell flat and the publishers were prosecuted.

THIS WAS ONLY A SCARE.

The splendid ceremonies in connection with the attaining of his majority by King Alfonso Saturday were attended by an excitement and interest significant in itself, created considerably.

FERRY BOAT DISASTERS

Collision in New York Harbor on Account of Fog.

Many Lives in Peril, But Only One Person Killed.

New York, May 19.—The Staten Island ferryboat Middleton arrived at her slip, foot of Whitehall street, from Staten Island, shortly before 11 o'clock this forenoon, with her cabin badly damaged by collision in the fog with the steam yacht Allen. It is reported that one man was killed. The Allen belongs to Richard Stevens, New York Yacht Club.

It is learned that the man killed was J. C. Atterbury, of New Brighton, S. I. No one else was hurt. The bowsprit of the yacht went into the men's cabin on the ferry, and the men were killed.

ANOTHER FERRYBOAT COLLISION.

New York, May 19.—The ferryboat Mauch Chunk of the Central Railroad of New Jersey collided with a railroad float off the battery today. The Mauch Chunk had numbers of passengers aboard and her captain did not back off the float for fear that the water would rush in at the hole made by the collision. The float and the ferryboat drifted down the bay together, and as there was a heavy fog, were soon lost to sight from shore. The ferryboats, Easton and Castleton went out to stand by the Mauch Chunk to take off the passengers if necessary. All the passengers were taken off. No one was hurt.

There were about 50 passengers on the ferryboat at the time there was much excitement.

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KING AND QUEEN WITNESS "SAPHO"

Royal Favor Showered on Olga Nethersole.

THE BARGAIN WITH MORGAN

White Star Line Said to Have Joined the Combine—Not Easy to Secure the Carriers.

London, May 19.—Brilliant audiences patronized the opera last week. On Wednesday, which marked Mme. Melba's first appearance, being star night, Caruso, a new tenor, who appeared with her, met with a hearty reception.

In the theatrical world Olga Nethersole was the recipient of unusual royal favor. On Monday King Edward and Queen Alexandra saw her perform in "Sapho," and Thursday the Prince and Princess of Wales followed the parental example. The king sent for Miss Nethersole at the end of the third act and complimented her on the performance. She was presented by the queen with a bouquet of heliotrope orchids. The lord chamberlain, the Earl of Clarendon, whose consent to the production of "Sapho" was only secured with much difficulty, was in attendance.

THE STEAMER COMBINE.

The shareholders of the White Star Line met here Saturday to consider the Morgan Atlantic shipping agreement. The meeting was well attended and private, but it is understood that the agreement was ratified.

J. Pierpont Morgan, while here, had several conferences with the leaders of the shipping combine. It is said that the combine is progressing quite satisfactorily, though no new developments can be recorded.

To the rumors of opposition to the English shipping combine, it is learned that J. Pierpont Morgan and those interested with him pay but small attention. Should all the outsiders create a community of interest, it is held that they could not affect the shipping combine. "They are welcome to the Canadian line," said one of those chiefly concerned. "It will not make any difference to us."

IT IS NOW DEFINITELY SAID THAT CONTROL OF THE CANADIAN LINE CANNOT BE SECURED PRIVATELY, AND NO DIRECTOR OF THAT LINE HIDE SUFFICIENT SHARES TO TURN OVER THE CONTROL.

If the Morgans accomplish anything with the Canadian Line, it will be by means of a company meeting.

The Morgans are much satisfied with the House of Lords and the committee granting them the right to construct a tube railroad from Ham-mersmith to Tottenham, about four miles, passing through the heart of the city via Piccadilly. The committee's decision now goes to parliament for confirmation. Mr. Yerkes now has a circle on both sides of London, while Mr. Morgan runs in the center and to the north.

KAISER'S GIFT TO AMERICA.

Commenting upon Emperor William's present to the United States, the Neue Freie Presse says:

The Kaiser's gift to America, which he witnessed it and in the chamber of deputies.
