
Presbytery Refuses to Sanction Separate Church at Lawrence Station.

The Presbytery of London was in ssion until after 6 o'clock last evening discussing a petition from the Presbyterians of Lawrence Station, asking for permission to establish a separate congregation at that place. At present Lawrence Station is under pastorate of Rev. Mr. Lawrence ho also has the work at Cowal and McBride, and it is provided with only one service a month. There are 3 families at Lawrence Station, and the ames of 107 persons were attached to

the petition.
