## MASSACRE OF WHITES BY INDIAN BAND; FIFTEEN SHOT TO PIECES BY YAQUIS

Prominent Mexican and American Mine Owners Wiped Ont After Desperate Battle Intends to Have Vote on in the Mountains of Mexico --- Four Women of Party Ruthlessly Murdered.

San Francisco, March 24 .- A dispatch to the Chronicle from Los Angeles says: News has reached this city of the murder of five members of the family of Pedro Meza, President of La Dura, in Sonora, Mexico, and brother-in-law of Frederick Hartman, president of the William Hoege Company of Los Angeles, and ten others, who were massacred by Indians within a few miles of their home and their bodies left in the roadway between Oritz and La Dura until a sufficient number of Mexican troops could be sent over to overawe the raiding outlaws and bring in their victims. The names of those killed are:

Senor Pedro Meza, President of La Dura, a rich mining contractor and one of the most prominent men in the

## GRADUATE NURSES ASSOCIATION

Designed to Give Nurses a Status, But Is Not a Close Corporotion-Some Objection.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Toronto, March 23 .- Premier Whitney did not carry out his threat of a busy Friday and an evening session, and the House adjourned at 5:15 today. By actual count there were present 23 Government and 6 Opposition members. A number of bills were put ferward a stage. The only interesting feature was the opposition on both sides to some provisions of the Graduate Nurses' Association bill. Mr. Ross announced that he intended to divide the House on the county councils bill. In moving the second reading of his bill to incorporate the Graduate Nurses' Association, Mr. Crawford claimed that it was not designed to create a close corporation, but only to give the nurses a status. It was therefore in the interests of the public. Mr. Graham thought the clause providing that institutions receiving Government grants should employ only members of the association was going too far. Other members also expressed disapproval of the bill, including Mr. Hoyle, its seconder, and Hon. Dr. Pyne. The latter pointed out that many nurses did not require scientific or technical knowledge, being only the sick. 
