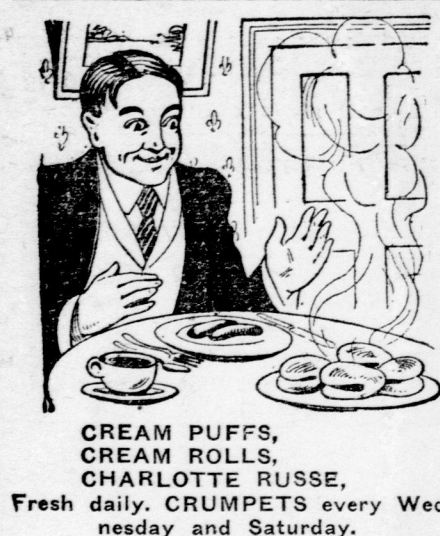

MITCHELL ACCOUNT WAS "LAID OVER"

No. 2 Committee Gives Mayor a Chance to Confer With the Hospital Trust.

No. 2 committee met last night, and transacted merely routine business.

Mr. Victor Mitchell presented an account for \$242 for the plans of the isolation hospital, but, on the request of Mayor Judd, it was laid over, as he desires to consult with the hospital trust.

Ald. Cooper moved that the city engineer be instructed not to carry out the order of the city council to gravel Edward street until the council provide the funds. The motion was adopted.

Mr. Jas. Fitzgerald and others appeared before the committee, and asked that a sewer be constructed on Dominica street. It was decided to proceed with the work at once.

The tender of C. W. Dill for the construction of sewers on Rectory street and Hamilton road was reaffirmed, and the work will go on at once.

The application of the Helena Costume Company for the privilege of running a steam pipe across King street was granted.

Closing of Nelson Street.

The application of the hospital trust to close Nelson street was laid over.

The latter day saints applied for permission to string a banner across a street. The request was granted.

The communication from Dr. Eccles, asking the committee to pave certain streets leading to the hospitals, was referred to next year's council.

The doctor's object is to provide smooth roadways so as to not inconvenience patients being taken to the hospitals.

Mr. J. Collins' application for permission to use a vacant lot on the corner of Gunn and Saunby streets as a city dump was granted.

Mr. W. H. Bartam suggested that Cavendish street, between Wilmot and Wilson avenue, in rear of the breakwater, be used as a city dump.

The water commission agreed to pay half the cost of repairing the culvert at the Cove. The offer was accepted.

Manager C. B. King, of the street railway, asked for an amendment to the bylaws for a pavement on Dundas street from Wellington to Adelaide street, to permit of a change in material for the foundation, and for the filler in the track allowance. The matter was laid over.

Mr. McFadden and others appeared before the committee in regard to the cleaning out of the water course through private property in the East End, but it was decided that nothing could be done with the matter except under the Ditches and Watercourses Act.

A communication was received from Hon. Wm. Pugsley, Minister of Public Works, informing the committee that the Dominion Government would pay its share of the cost of a permanent pavement on Queen's avenue, west of Richmond street, if the city decided to lay one. Filed for reference.
