

CAPT. TATLOW DEAD

Former Member of B. C. Government Dies From Injuries.

Vancouver, B. C., April 12.-Hon. Robert G. Tatlow, formerly in the Mc-Bride cabinet, who was thrown from his rig on Friday afternoon, striking his head on the stone pavement, died early yesterday morning, not having regained consciousness.

He was an Irishman, 55 years of age Educated in England, he came to the coast many years ago. In 1894, he was an unsuccessful candidate for the Legislature, but in 1960, was elected, and politics: in subsequent contests. In 1903 he was appointed minister of finance and agriculture.

Prior to last election, he resigned from the Government, owing to differences over the C. N. R. deal.


