RATES FOR FAIR

Another Excursion Day Has Been Added to the Exhibition.

Secretary A. M. Hunt has received word from the Eastern Passenger Association that the request of the Western Fair board for better railway arrangements had been received and granted.

As a result of the application, Tuesday has been added as an additional excursion day, making three altogether, Tuesday, Thursday and Friday of fair week. This will be a decided improvement, and will greatly benefit the Western Fair.

Equally satisfactory terms have been arranged as to fares. The special one-way rate has been granted on all roads leading into the city during the week. In other years, the fares were fare and one-third. All tickets will be good until Monday, Sept. 16, after the fair is over.

The rates will apply from Kingston on the East, an extension from Toronto, and to Detroit and Port Huron. This is particularly advantageous in the west, and will result in a largely-increased attendance.

"We are well satisfied," said Mr. Hunt.

BOARD WANTS OWN INSPECTOR

Health Men Will Ask the City Council To Provide the Funds.

DUMPS ARE REQUIRED

Until the Incinerator is in Shape They Will Be an Absolute Necessity in the City.

The board of health will have a health inspector of their own. At the special meeting held Tuesday afternoon, the question was brought up by Dr. Williams, the chairman, and he was appointed to attend the meeting of No. 3 committee of the city council tonight to express the opinion of the board on the matter.

"I think we should have a proper man," said Mr. W. H. Abbott. "A young man, with plenty of energy is needed for this department."

"What about taking over Mr. Latham?" asked Dr. Williams.

"He is under the city's control," said R. A. Carrothers. "We want an independent man, the best we can get."

Dr. Williams was, as a result, instructed to present this feature of the case to the council tonight.

"Of course, the council have the last say in the matter," commented Mr. Carrothers. "If they do not give us the money our little scheme will not go through. We must have their hands."

To Furnish Dumps.

The city council will be asked to furnish suitable dumps throughout the city. All those available have been closed. The board members were of the opinion that dumps are absolutely necessary.

"We cannot get a dump unless the city furnishes the money," said Mr. R. A. Carrothers. "We must have them in the city until the incinerator plant is ready."

"We have no right to furnish dumps, that is the city's business," commented Dr. Williams. "If we have the council asked to furnish us with them, we will look after their sanitary condition."

This motion carried unanimously. Mr. W. H. Abbott said that it was high time something was done towards the construction of the incinerator. Nearly three months had gone, and practically nothing had been accomplished.

City Clerk Baker reported that the board of works intended moving right away in the matter, and the board of health would be consulted.

Dr. Williams will discuss the question of closing the market houses this evening with No. 3 committee.

Closing the Fish Market.

"We want to impress them that we mean business," said Mr. Manning. "The fish market and the basement of the Covent market house must be closed on May 15. We have ordered that done, and our ruling will have to be complied with."

The board agreed to that.

Secretary Baker reported that he had sent notices to all the property owners along Carling's Creek that they must discontinue putting refuse in the creek. Prosecutions will follow if the practice is continued.

Dr. Williams reported that the Hyman Company were not putting any deleterious matter into Carling's Creek. The Provincial board had written asking what had been done, but were informed that everything was now satisfactorily arranged.

The chairman reported that Dr. Tullin and Dr. Hutchinson were inspecting milk, and if reports were true prosecutions would follow.

Those present at the meeting were Chairman Dr. Williams, Dr. Burdon, W. H. Abbott, R. A. Carrothers, Inspector McCallum and Secretary S. Baker.
