Financial Post Compares the Building Progress of the Canadian Cities.

JUMP IS SHOWN TO BE 32 PER CENT.

To the Month of August Building in This City Compares Very Favorably.

Figures received from the building nspectors in the various cities and towns throughout Canada by the Financial Post show that the month of August is far ahead of the same month last year with regard to the estimated value of permits granted for the erection of buildings. Fiftytwo municipalities are represented in the table below, and the grand total of permits issued during the past month is almost \$20,000,000. In comparison with figures for the corresponding month of 1911, the totals show an aggregate increase of 56.8 per cent, which is an unusually large increase, especially when it is con-sidered that twenty-three out of forty-seven cities included in these totals are in Eastern Canada. In divisions, east and west, the west has, as would be expected, the percentage increase, namely, 64.3 per cent, but the east is well up to that mark with a 46.7 per cent increase. amounts to almost seven million dollars. On a rough calculation it is found that on a per capita basis three times as much building was projected during August in the west as in the east. The same is true of permits granted during the first eight

months also.

In the matter of decreases western division has six, and eastern, five, but owing to the large decrease of over half a million by Montreal, the aggregate by the former is not so large as that shown by the latter. Outside of this large decline, by Montreal, and the failure of Winnipeg to keep up with the pace of last August by a quarter of a million dollars, the other decreases are small, and are not of great importance, as a longer period than one month is needed to give a fair rep-resentation of a city's building re-

Toronto Booms. The large increase made by the eastern cities last month is mainly WAS REPRESENTED due to a gain of almost two million dollars made by Toronto. Accountable for this is the large permit of Meeting Held to Make Further of Toronto gymnasium building, but outside of that, the gain is unusualy large. In fact, Toronto's increase s over 75 per cent of the total increase made by twenty-two other cities east of the Great Lakes.
