Ans. - The choice between painting and papering the wals depends so much upon the condition of the plaster If it is a good rough cast there are stains and paints that give a most desirable finish, but if they are rent in excellent shape every crack will show. For a smooth surfaced plaster I would prefer paper. You could make no mistake in selecting a warm tan, putty color or a greenish grey for all the rooms. will find that the same color or different shades of the same color are most restful in rooms that connect. In fact, many of the new houses are done allke all over, the variation being made by the rugs and draperies. Keep all the cellings a creamy white and if desired they may be tinted when paper is used on the side
