Paper or Paint Best?
Dear Miss Grey—I would like to ask your advice about decorating the walls in my dining-room, living-room and a smaller room opening off the living-room. This used as a music-room and library and has built-in bookcases. The living-room faces north and has one window. The smaller room opening off this has one north and one west window; dining-room has double east window, also has a built-in china closet. Now, please tell me which is most advisable, to paper and paint the walls, and what colors I should use.

Ans.—The choice between painting and papering the walls depends so much upon the condition of the plaster that it is a good rough cast there are stains and paints that give a most desirable finish, but if they are not in excellent shape every crack will show. For a smooth surfaced plaster I would prefer paper. You could make no mistake in selecting a warm tan, putty color or a greenish grey for all the rooms. You will find that the color or different shades of the same color are most restful in rooms that connect. In fact, many of the new houses are done alike all over, the variation being made by the rugs and draperies. Keep all the ceilings a creamy white and if desired they may be tinted when paper is used on the side walls.

AMERICAN BEAUTY.
A—1. As the bride couple will be leaving on their wedding trip on the day of the ceremony it would be necessary for the bride to have acknowledged the gifts previously, if at all possible. People usually send their presents to reach the bride, at least a couple of days before the ceremony, and she should be prompt in acknowledging them. Some brides pen

all the notes of thanks as the gifts are received, and leave the envelopes for other members of the family to mail the day after the wedding.
2. It is really better for acknowledgments of this kind to come straight from the heart than to follow a stilted outline. But something like this would be suitable: "My Dear Mrs. Brown: Accept my hearty thanks for the beautiful water-pitcher and also for your kind wishes which accompanied the gift. The design is such a pretty one, I think, and the pitcher will certainly be an ornament for my table. I sincerely trust that when I get settled in my new home you will come often to see me. James joins me in thanking you for your kind thought for us."

3. Yes, address one envelope to "Mr. and Mrs. Blank," and one to "Misses Blank," if their happens to be more than one daughter.
4. Wedding invitations are usually sent out two or three weeks before the wedding. Announcement cards are mailed the day following the ceremony.
5. I presume that your idea is to have the wedding breakfast for the attendants and intimate friends and relatives, and follow that with a larger reception for other friends who have not been invited to the ceremony. For such a reception it would be nice to serve coffee, tea, and punch, with sandwiches, salad, nuts, fancy cakes and wafers, and ice cream of some sort.

A Candle For Mothers.

Dear Miss Grey: I am quite interested in your very useful column. I am sure you must have some patience to answer so many questions. I also come to you myself for help, if you will please answer. Some time ago, I read in your column of a certain candle that will kill moths and bed bugs. I cut the bit out of the paper, but lost it. Will you please tell me if it will hurt anything in the room, or should the room be empty.

A—1. I think it was a formaldehyde candle that some reader recommended to use; she stated that it could be purchased at any drug store. I fancy it would be necessary to clear the room of furnishings and close the doors after the candle takes effect, but doubtless instructions come along with the candle.

With little sugar, then put layer of crumbs over your apple, dot crumbs with bits of the butter and dash of nutmeg. Continue in this way until all crumbs and apples are used. Mix the water and apples are used. Turn over and around sides of the pan. Set the pudding dish in minutes or until apples are tender. Serve hot with foamy sauce.

Lima Bean Salad.
Two cups of cooked lima beans. Have beans very cold. Pour over them four tablespoons of malt vinegar, one teaspoon of grated onion, half teaspoon of salt and dash of paprika. Toss all together and serve on a nest of shredded lettuce.

Much of the flavor, delicacy and wholesomeness of food depends upon the proper use of the utensils used in preparing it. Besides, cooking utensils properly cared for last much longer than those which are not. Tin, wood or iron utensils should be as carefully washed and wiped as the dining room china and glass.

HEAR FINE PAPERS

Two Members Present Excellent Papers at Recent Meeting.

Very excellent papers were given at the last meeting of the Goldstream Women's Institute, held in Foresters' Hall, Poplar Hill, recently. The subjects were: "Resolved That To Manage a House Successfully Requires More Skill Than To Manage a Farm," and "Skill Required To Manage a Farm."

Mrs. Archie Campbell read the first paper and pointed out that full credit had not always been given the farm-ers, who for her share in her husband's success as a farmer. This was especially true where he was engaged in mixed farming, when the efforts of the energetic, frugal wife, in looking after the butter, poultry, and garden, rendered them a thriving asset of the farm life. The farmer's wife with few exceptions worked without conveniences, such as the bread-mixer, patent dishwasher, vacuum cleaner, etc., although her husband might have the most up-to-date machinery on the market. Yet she accomplished wonders with the means she had. In farm work, it was stated, a man might profit by his mistakes of the year before, but in a woman's life, one mistake in the training of a child could never be remedied.

The second paper was prepared and read by Mrs. John Bycraft. A farmer's work required great skill, she said. It was now an acknowledged fact that the twentieth century farmer required more intelligence to be successful than in any other business. A farmer needed to possess a knowledge of many

Take six firm apples, peel and core, place in deep bread pan. Stir one-half cup of granulated sugar into one cup of water and turn over apples. Fill the space made by taking out core with cinnamon drops. Bake until apples are soft, basting every few minutes with syrup in pan.
