Only Few Hundred Left—The Belgian Flag Replaced and Left on Town

[Canadian Press.]

London, Oct. 23.-10:50 a.m.-A Rotterdam dispatch to the Star says: "The movement of the German troops westward from Antwerp has left only a few hundred men in the town. batch left yesterday morning, and most of the great forts are now without guards.
