### WINDSOR WILL FIGHT ATTEMPT TO RAISE PRICE OF NATURAL GAS

Mayor Winter Declares Companies Have Made Big Profits.

INADEQUATE

Border Official Urges Government Not To Take Any Action.

Windsor, Feb. 12.—Inasmuch as it is a natural product and as such should belong to the people, the city of Windsor will fight any attempt on the part of the natural gas companies to raise the price, said Mayor Winter today, commenting upon the request of a delegation of natural gas company officials that waited upon Premier Drury on Tuesday.

The city's franchise calls for gas at 30c per thousand, which, his worship believes, is sufficient to cover operating expenses and pay a reasonable profit upon investments.

"When the supply was adequate the companies made huge profits," he said, "and now when the supply is inadequate, they desire to raise the price to the consumers to provide money to drill other wells. This work should be done out of the profits reaped in the past."

His worship welcomed the announcement that a series of investigation meetings are to be held at different points within the natural gas area and expressed a hope that Windsor would be favored.



Summing up the campaign the Times correspondent says "Some people are doubtful whether the glamor of a great name would stand the test of an election arena, but Mr Assulth has strengthened rather Mr. Asquith has strengthened rather than weakened his position in this respect. If a candidate could win by the impression of his own personality on an electorate Mr. Asquith's return to Westminster would already be assured, but what is still doubtful is whether his personality can triumph.

Paris, Feb. 12.—Raoul Peret was to-day elected president of the chamber of deputies by 372 of the 425 votes cast.

M. Peret succeeds Paul Deschanel, who was recently elected president of the republic.
