of Fatal July Flood

By a remarkable coincidence the memorable July flood which created devastation in London and vicinity 38 years ago, fell on the exact day of the month as Sunday's storm. Under date of July 10, 1883, the Dominion Annual Register, under the section entitled Journal of Remark-

able Occurrences, says:

"Very heavy rains in the district above London, cause a sudden and unprecedented rise of the River Thames, and in a short time the suburbs of London West and Kensington are completely under water, and large portions of London are flooded. Immense damage is done."

"Houses, bridges, etc., are carried away in all directions, and so sudden is the rise of the waters that fourteen persons falled to escape. The names of the drowned are: Mrs. Hopkins, Mrs. Hutchinson, Mrs. Constance, three children of R. F. Lacey, three children of George Stratfold, stance, three children of Mr. Orr, infant daughter of Mr. Melin, a child of
