

LONDON LABOR WANTS SCHOOL LAW ENFORCED

Trades Council Protests Civic Motion To Repeal Adolescent Act.

HESSSEL SCORES ROLLO

Carpenters' Delegate Thinks Minister Should Have Answered Letter.

Criticism and commendation for members of the Ontario Legislature found expression at the regular meeting of the London Trades and Labor Council Wednesday.

While the delegates endorsed the legislation passed by the provincial government pertaining to the adolescent school attendance act, the Hon. Walter Rollo, minister of labor, was the subject of direct and bitter criticism by reason of his apparent failure to answer a communication sent him two weeks ago relative to the "fair wage" problem.

Introduced by William Tite, delegate to the council from the International Machinists' Union, the following resolution was discussed at considerable length on the floor of the council and passed without discussion:

Urge Enforcement.
Whereas the Ontario Legislature in 1919 passed the adolescent act, and whereas the London City Council adopted a motion for repeal of the aforesaid act, be it resolved, that the London Trades and Labor Council protest the action of the city council and petition the Ontario Legislature to keep this act on the statute book.

Upon the shoulders of the various industrial and other big employers of labor do these delegates to the trades and labor council place blame for the inferiority of Canadian school children that would compel them to remain at their studies longer than they may at present.

If the employers pay a "decent wage," as the labor leaders term it, the fathers of the children would be placed in a better position to keep their children at school, and not allow them to leave at an early age to work in shop or factory.

Ask for Scholarships.
That the authorities, either provincial or civic, should proffer as added inducements, scholarships for high standings, of a substantial financial nature, that would enable more children of the working class to attain a college training, is the firm contention of the delegates who will voice their opinion Wednesday, and the same will be submitted to the city council.

Not long since the latter endorsed the stand of the Chatham councillors who protested against the enforcement of the new regulations of the adolescent act, which elevates the age at which children may obtain working permits, from 14 to 16 years.

World Stars Merge in Giant Circus

THOUGH not generally known, it is a fact that the circus family antedates the best-known names of the stage. One hears a great deal about the aristocracy of the footlights. The Barrymores, the Drews, the Jeffersons and others point with pride to the long line of ancestors who trod the boards before them. Yet, the people of the white tops trace their names still farther back.

In Ringling Brothers and Barnum & Bailey Shows combined are gathered all the foremost artists of Spangland. The consolidation of these famous institutions has made this possible. Now, and for the first time in circus history, one finds such names as the following on a single program: The Ernestos, Rooneys, Clarks, De Koes, Siegrists, Silbon, Bradnas and many others whose grandfathers wore the spangles of the sawdust realm. Here the patron finds the entire aristocracy of circudom in ensemble.

It is the rule rather than the exception for the son or daughter of a performer to follow in the footsteps of his parents. As soon as they leave school the children join their elders to be put through the mysteries of their first somersault or to feel the yielding back of a horse beneath their feet. This is the way the "business" is kept up.

The teachers are the most willing in the world, for each parents lives in the hope that his child may become a greater performer than himself. The combining of the "world's greatest shows" and the "greatest show on earth" has resulted in bringing hundreds of performers under one "big top," yet, out of the vast number, a census would discover that the total includes no less than 47 families.

The aristocracy of the family extends to those who are prominent in the brilliant introductory revue, which opens the main tent program. Yvette Gerra, who is a prominent figure in the mammoth pageant, is of a family well known in the annals of European pantomime. Her uncle, Jules Turnour, aged 70, is one of the

business. Delegate R. Hessel, representing local carpenters, introduced for discussion the 'fair wage' problem.

"At the last meeting," he pointed out, "we directed a communication be sent to the minister of labor seeking information upon a certain subject. We have received no reply."

Criticize Rollo.
"I would like to see his hand forced in this manner. As a public servant and a cabinet minister, the least that the Hon. Walter Rollo could do would be to have the common courtesy to reply to our letter. It appears to me that they are trying to evade the issue in Toronto, and we should give it back to them as strong as they give it to us."

It was directed that another communication be sent to the department of labor asking Mr. Rollo to send a full copy of such legislation pertaining to the 'fair wage' clause in all government contracts as claimed to have been passed by the provincial government in 1900, and also to furnish a wage schedule for the work of construction of Western University buildings complying, however, with local rates of pay and conditions.

Delegate Hessel explained that at a conference in Toronto last January the government representatives admitted that legislation had been passed in 1900, but no copy of the same was produced at the time.

DISMISS PLEA OF MAURICE BALDWIN

Privy Councillors Uphold Judgment of Appeal Court of Quebec.

MONTREAL, July 5.—The privy council has dismissed with costs the appeal of Maurice Day Baldwin, grandson of a former prime minister of Canada, and son of a former Bishop of Huron, against a judgment of the court of appeals of Quebec, granting Mrs. Baldwin separation from her husband, \$75 a month and the care of her children, according to a cable received at the office of Ewing & McFadden, lawyers for Mrs. Baldwin.

A majority judgment of the court of appeal in Montreal on Dec. 30, 1920, reversed a decision of the superior court, and granted the appeal of Mrs. Day Baldwin for separation from her husband, Maurice E. Day Baldwin.

Mr. Baldwin was ordered to pay his wife \$75 a month, and the care of the three children was confided to Mrs. Baldwin, with permission to the father to visit them three times a week, "but," the judgment added, "under the supervision of a person to be named by the appellant, seeing that it is to be feared—taking into account the father's past conduct—he may take possession of the children."

PREDICTS DEFEAT OF DRURY REGIME

G. Howard Ferguson Raps Ontario Premier As Idealist in Vancouver Speech.

VANCOUVER, B.C., July 5.—"Ontario is tired of group government and when we have our next election, which will be either this fall or next, the issue will be which of the two old parties will be returned to power," declared G. Howard Ferguson, K.C., of Toronto, leader of the Ontario Conservative party, yesterday. Mr. and Mrs. Ferguson have just returned here from a visit to Alaska and Attlin.

"Premier Drury, while an educated man and clever, is an idealist, a Fabian socialist whose legislation is always utopian in its objectives," said Mr. Ferguson. "He has been compelled at the last two sessions to abandon a large portion of his legislative program because it savored of

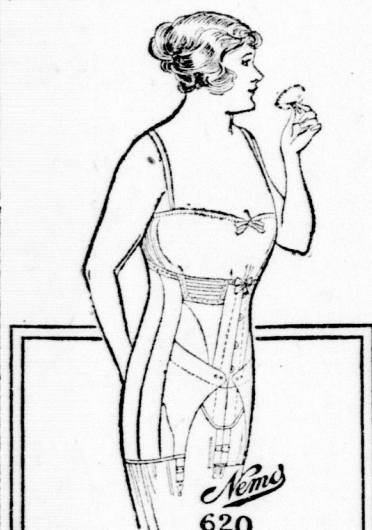

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DELEGATES TO LEAGUE NAMED

Fielding, Lapointe and Larkin Will Represent Canada At Geneva.

Finance Minister May Negotiate New Trade Treaties While Overseas.

OTTAWA, July 5.—(By Canadian Press).—Hon. W. S. Fielding, minister of finance, Hon. Ernest Lapointe, minister of marine and fisheries, and Hon. P. C. Larkin, Canadian high commissioner in London, will represent Canada at the next assembly of the League of Nations which opens at Geneva on September 4. Announcement to this effect was made officially tonight.

Delorme To Occupy "Furious Ward" With Holland, Slayer, As Companion

MONTREAL, July 5.—According to competent authority, Adelard Delorme is to be placed in the "Furious Ward" of the St. Jean de Dieu Hospital. There he will have as companion Major Griffith, the murderer of the stockbroker, Holland, and other hopelessly insane persons.

The patients at Longue Point are constant readers of at least three of the Montreal dailies and are therefore as fully in touch with the tortuous windings of the Delorme case as the general public. They now take

added interest in the problem of the disposal of the priest on account of his being marked out as a resident among them, probably for all time. It was stated today, and not denied by counsel for Delorme, that the three sisters of the accused are under interdiction for a number of years, and cannot act for him in any business relations. They are therefore unable to dispose of his property, place mortgages or carry out any of the behests which the priest might be inclined to make.

The matter of a trade treaty between the two governments has been discussed to the extent of approaches having been made to the government by the French consul-general at Montreal some weeks ago. At that time the government intimated its willingness to enter into negotiations "at a convenient time," but since then no action has been taken.

Referring to this matter, which was raised in the House of Commons during the recent session, Mr. Fielding said he anticipated that "one of these days the French government will take

some further action; that they will give us some information as to what they suggest and our desire is to have again with France as comprehensive a treaty as we had a few years ago."

There is also the question of a treaty with Greece which may be taken up while the minister is overseas.

The minister of finance will take up various departmental matters between these governments and the government of Canada, it is understood.

One of the matters which it is thought may engage his attention while in Paris, will be that of resuming negotiations with the French government for a more comprehensive trade treaty between Canada and France than now exists.

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WILL FLOAT LOAN EARLY IN AUTUMN

OTTAWA, July 5.—If it is decided to raise the money required by the government to meet loans maturing on Dec. 1, in Canada, the domestic loan will probably be floated in the early autumn. This was the statement of Hon. W. S. Fielding, minister of finance, today.

He stated that the government had not yet taken any steps in regard to the new loan, but that the early autumn would be the best time to raise money through a domestic loan.

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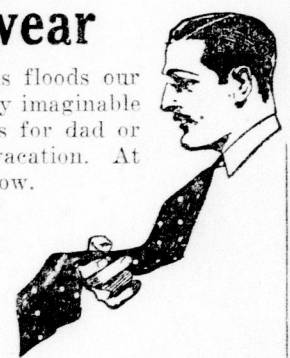
