Sarnia, Feb. 12 .- At a special and secret meeting, Saturday night, the Sarnia Hydro Commission proceeded about its official and somewhat coldblooded business of discharging Berbert Wainwright, the present manager of the hydro system, and replacing him by James E. B. Phelps, former manager, dismissed by the 1922 commission. First the commissioners acted on Mr. Phelps' resignation as a commissioner, then discharged the present manager and appointed Mr. Phelps to the vacancy created. To Mr. Wainwright, by way of some small recompense they voted full small recompense they salary to the end of March.

Mr. Wainwright accepted the position philosophically, despite his contract, and the fact that he had had no part in the circumstances which caused the dismissal of Mr. Phelps, and then his reinstofement. and then his reinstatement. Mr. Phelps' appointment is effective from Monday. The commissioners at their Monday. The commissioners at their meeting Saturday went to some pains to hide the fact from the press that hey were to meet This is a new policy in hydro ad-

ministration locally, sponsored by Mayor Cook. The wish of the com-missioners is to hold their meetings behind closed doors, and give to the public such information as they may see fit to. The commissioners contend that the hydro differs from other civic departments, and that if the commissioners so desire they may exclude the press from their meetings.

The official action taken Saturday eight closes the controversy which has kept the hydro in the limlight for a number of months.

nen, while their wives, children and weethearts stood by weeping. Fifty-ive men remain in the mine, believed to be dead. Two escaped and made eir way to safety. The miners were buried in the emetery under the hills of Rail Canyon, alongside hundreds of other men who have lost their lives in mine

disasters here.

If any of the remaining 55 miners are found alive, it will be considered a miracle. All hope has been abandoned, even by the surviving families of the missing men. All believe now that the others must have since perished even if they were not killed instantly by the great blast. Rescue crews have now searched more than half the area of the mine, but it may be several days, according to mine officials, before the remote recesses are penetrated. Many tunnels affected by the explosion are still blocked by refuse, and ventilation facilities have been disrupted.


