SEN. PROUDFOOT PASSES AFTER BRIEF ILLNESS

Former Leader of Ontario
Liberals Dies in Toronto
Hospital.

WAS BORN IN HURON
Appointed to Upper Chamber
by Borden in Novem-
ber, 1919.

Toronto, Dec. 3.—Senator William H. Proudfoot, former leader of the Liberal opposition in the Ontario Legislature, and senior member of the law firm of Proudfoot, Duncan, Gilday & Grant, died early this morning at the Wellesley Hospital. He had been taken there a week ago Saturday, when an emergency operation for appendicitis had been performed. The operation, however, came too late. The senator had, for one week previous to submitting to it, endured violent abdominal illness at his home, and when he finally

found that he was suffering from a
gangrenous appendix with spreading
peritonitis. He clung to life for one
week, however, with a tenacity that,
considering the gravity of his condi-
tion, was remarkable, but the ulti-

A funeral service for the deceased
will be held at 8 o'clock tomorrow
evening at the residence of his son at
11 Whitney avenue. The remains
will be taken by the 6:50 Grand
Trunk train on Tuesday morning to
Goderich, where a service will be held

Church, interment taking place af-
terwards to Maitland Cemetery.

The late Mr. Proudfoot was widely
known in the Province of Ontario,
where for many years he was a lead-
ing Liberal and capable legislator, as
well as being a prominent member
of the Ontario bar. He was first
elected to the Ontario Legislature for
Center Huron as a Liberal in 1903,
and was re-elected in 1911 and 1914.
With him it was a case of the office
seeking the man, as he had been
proffered the Liberal nomination for
Center Huron in 1902, but had re-
fused to become a candidate.

Mr. Proudfoot was one of the Lib-
eral leaders in the Legislature for
some time, but he broke with the
party on the conscription issue and
became a Unionist. He was elected
in Center Huron in the provincial
general election of 1919, when J. M.
Govenlock was the successful Lib-
eral candidate, and Mr. Proudfoot
was second in a three-cornered con-
test.

On Nov. 6, 1919, Mr. Proudfoot was
appointed to the Senate of Canada
by Sir Robert B. Borden, then Do-
minion premier.

Born in Colborne Township, County
of Huron, Feb. 21, 1859, Mr. Proud-
foot was educated in the Goderich
Public School and by private tuition.
He graduated in law at Osgoode Hall,
became a barrister and settled down
to practice his profession in Goderich.
In 1902 he became head of the legal
firm of Proudfoot, Duncan, Grant &
Sims, Toronto, but he continued to
regard Goderich as his home. In the
early period of his public career Mr.
Proudfoot was reeve of Goderich,
which office he held for ten years. He
was secretary-treasurer of the Huron
Law Association, and for many years
was president of the Huron Liberal
Association. He was financially in-
terested in a number of industrial
concerns at Goderich. He was a
prominent temperance advocate.
Hon. Mr. Proudfoot married Marion
F. Dickson, by whom he had two
children. He was a member of the
Church of England.

those who had helped him squander
his substance, he suffered in a two-
fold way—from the realization that
he had cheated himself, and from the
fact that he could blame no one else
for the predicament in which he
found himself.

It is probable that the prodigal son
asked his former associates, "Where

are friends who helped me spend my
money?" and their reply was doubt-
less, "We are looking for another
fool."

He further suffered when he was
forced to work at a very menial posi-
tion in order to "win his daily
bread, he the son of a wealthy man
who had lived in opulence, but who

had not had sufficient sense to con-
sider himself well off in his former
state at home.

He "emptied his pocket" and was
then forced to "pocket his pride."

In drawing the moral from this
parable Mr. Dewey depicted to his
listeners how the people of today are
following the example of the prodigal

son when they waste their time and
talents in attending to non-essentials
—in relegating worth-while affairs to
the background in order to attend
to purely mundane things.

We waste our time and talents by
misapplication, and we abuse them
by not applying them to their full
extent, but we make them grow and

become a decided asset for
spiritual welfare when we spend
—in the better things of life.
