

#### SAYS WORLD NEEDS **VOICE OF EMPIRE**

Sir Robert Declares Britain Must Heed Desires of Her Dominions.

SPEAKS AT NEW HAVEN

Tells U. S. Historical Society United Commonwealth Essential To Peace.

New Haven, Conn., Dec. 29 .- (By anadian Press.)—"It is essential as much for Great Britain as for her sister nations that the voice of the whole commonwealth shall speak; it is mightier than the voice of the United Kingdom alone."

These words by Sir Robert Borden were not of a address which Sir

were part of an address which Sir Robert delivered before the American Historical Association here last night on "The British Commonwealth of Nations: Features of External Relations."
The address was a highly impor-

The address was a nighty impor-tant contribution to discussions on Canada's constitutional relations. Throughout it was of interest to note Sir Robert used the term "British Commonwealth of Nations" in pref-erence to "British Empire," pointing out how the former term had been recognized both in the constitution. recognized both in the constitution of the Irish Free State and in the oath to be taken by members of the Irish Free State Parliament.

Need Prompt Decision. "In what manner, by what authority, shall the external policy of the Commonwealth be determined and announced?" Sir Robert asked after sketching recent constitutional development. "Often there is need of prompt and firm decision. How shall the voice of the Commonwealth be ascertained when the delegates have scattered from the council table? Here we encounter difficulties of great seriousness and complexity which, notwithstanding the contrary decision reached in 1921, must eventu-ally be met and solved at a constitutional conference as was unani-mously agreed in 1917. "The failure of the Dominions to

accept and support a policy of vital concern would seriously affect the Commonwealth's influence and presige.

Consult By Cable.

"While the present situation con-tinues the best that can be hoped for as a system of frequent consultations by cable, and occasional consultation and discussion by conference when domestic political duties permit the Dominion ministers to at-

And, with increasing voice and influence in external relations, the dominions must necessarily accept and realise their wider responsibilities. "It is impossible," Sir Robert declared, "for them to assert a national status unless they are prepared to assume corresponding national obligations for the commonwealth's safety. It cannot be doubted that within the British league of nations their security is greater and their responsi-bilities in this respect less burden-some than if they should withdraw. "Within that league there are six nations under a single allegiance and with a developing status in their political relationship. Their unity rests upon the ideals of liberty, autonomy and co-operation.

Find World Unity. "In like manner the world's unity for peace must be found in the realization of public right and interna-tional justice and in the understanding and co-operation that can only be gained around a common council board; and these essentials cannot be secured without a recognized sys-tem of periodical conferences at

tem of periodical conferences at which representatives of the nations shall meet upon equal footing.

"Although denied the powerful aid of the United States, the League of Nations has accomplished great things for the world's peace during the past three years.
