## SENATE REFORM PARLEY DEFERRED FOR PRESENT

Question of Federal Election Precludes Possibility of Conference Yet.

### NO MOVE MADE

Question Will Remain Open Unless Parliament Is Dissolved.

Ottawa, July 22.—The conference between the dominion and provincial governments on senate reform and other constitutional questions, which was to have been called during the parliamentary recess, may be regarded as deferred for the present. It is not likely to be held this summer. The question of a federal election, whether decision regarding it is taken within the next few days or delayed, precludes the possibility of a conference. If it is not decided at the next full meeting of the cabinet to dissolve parliament, the question will remain open, and no conference will be called so long as an election is a possibility.

No move has been made by the government since prorogation toward calling the conference on senate reform. The speech from the throne at the opening of parliament on February 5 announced that parliament would be asked to sanction such a conference. Parliament in due course gave its sanction. Before that, however, a very considerable sentiment developed in the house of commons and outside it antagonistic to any tampering with the constitution. Effort was made to have the suggestion of constitutional reform interpreted as leading in the direction of separation from the empire. It was even argued that proposal to change the B. N. A. would be regarded by enemies of the British empire as a move towards annexation to the U.S. Advocates of senate reform had little to encourage them in the performance of the upper house during the past session. The senate did not come off second best in any difference it had with the commons, and a good many observers bestow praise upon it for its revision of the Home Bank Bill, rejection of the rural credits measure, the killing of the amendments to the criminal code regarding the publication of racing news and its investigation into the railway situation. The senate undoubtedly gained friends and fortified its position during the closing days of the session.

Everything considered, therefore, it is unlikely that the move, in the direction of reform will be advanced in the immediate future, or that the proposed conference on constitutional changes will be called before the next session of parliament.

## EVOLUTION FIGHT SPREADS RAPIDLY

District of Columbia and California Now Involved in Battle.

### ASK FOR INJUNCTION

Washington, July 22.—An action which may throw the whole evolution question into the federal courts for judicial determination as to whether the teaching of this scientific theory inculcates disrespect for the Holy Bible was begun here today by Lorne H. Whitner, a government employee.

The vehicle employed is a rider to the 1925 District of Columbia appropriation bill which provides that "no part of this sum (for the public schools) shall be available for the salary of any superintendent who permits the teaching of, or any teacher who teaches disrespect for the Holy Bible."

The action is in the nature of an injunction proceeding directed at the auditor and disbursing officer of the District of Columbia, and Frank White, treasurer of the United States, to prohibit them from making further payments of salaries to Frank W. Ballou, superintendent of schools, and W. P. Hay, head of the department of biology and chemistry in the Washington high schools.

Immediately upon the filing of the proceedings Justice Siddons of the District of Columbia supreme court issued a rule on the two district officials, Daniel J. Donovan and James R. Lusby and Mr. White, directing them to appear July 28 to show cause why an injunction should not be issued against them.

### PROTEST IN CALIFORNIA.

San Francisco, July 22.—Scientists and theologians of California have started their clash over the teaching of evolution in this state. Maynard Shipley, president of the Science League of America, appeared before the state board of education yesterday to protest against action of the board last April declaring evolution could be taught in the public schools only as a theory and not as a fact.

The board also received communications from the Rev. Robert Schuler, pastor of the Trinity Methodist church of Los Angeles, who denounced certain illustrated text books on mythology as having a demoralizing influence on boys and girls.

## BUSES TO REPLACE ANOTHER RAIL LINE

Will Begin Operation Between Woodstock and Ingersoll On October 1.

Woodstock, July 22.—The Ingersoll, Woodstock and Thames Valley electric railway, operating a street car service between Woodstock and Ingersoll, a distance of 12 miles, will be scrapped and replaced by an auto bus service this fall. It was announced this morning as a result of negotiations which are being carried on between the company, the city of Woodstock, and the town of Ingersoll. Judge J. G. Wallace, who is in charge of the railway, has applied to the city council for cancellation of the franchise whereby the company operates over certain streets in Woodstock.

According to an announcement by officials of the line, a greatly improved bus service will be in operation by October 1. The work of removing the rails will begin on Sept. 1. The Thames Valley Railway has operated since 1900, and under its agreement with the city of Woodstock it pays in addition to taxes, a \$500 annual rental for right of way. Two buses will be put into operation on October 1, and will run every half-hour.

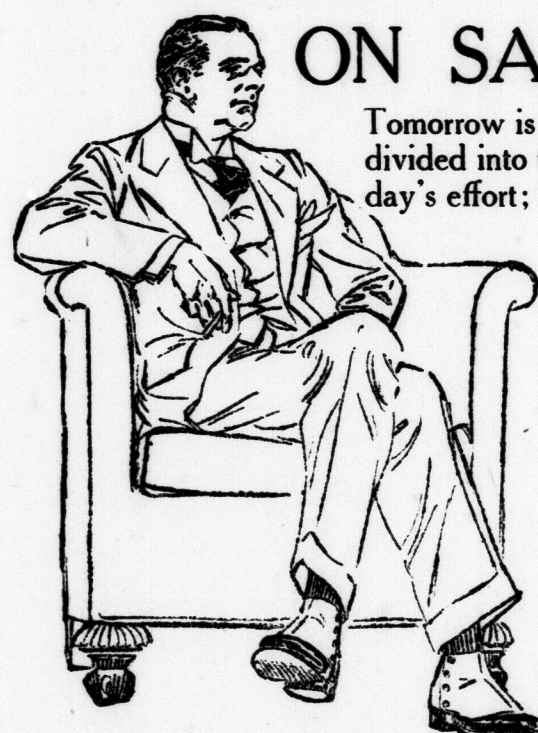
Jimmy Hubbard Slips Off Roof of Brantford School.

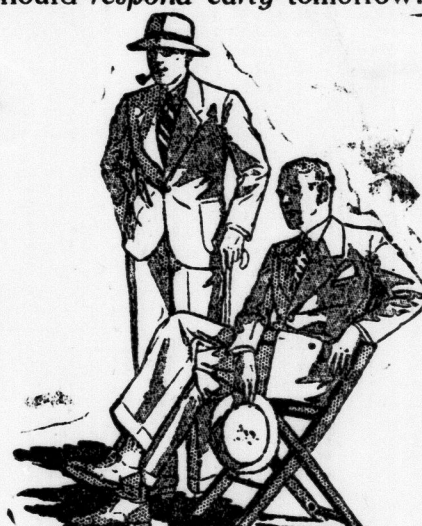

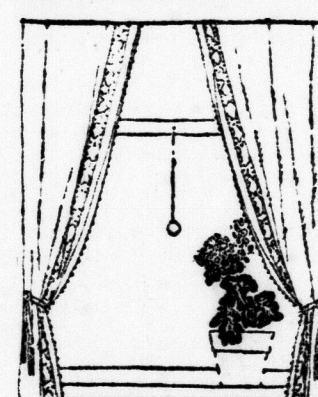

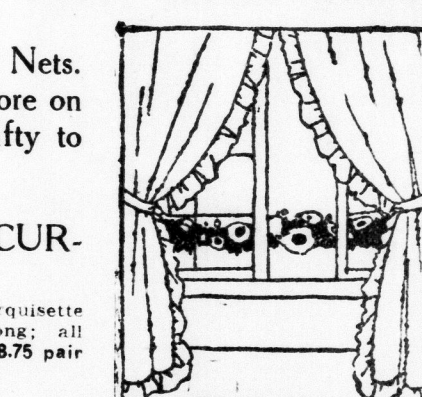
