Evading the Customs.

"You can't get them back. Go away!" These words, heard proceeding from the interior of the custom's office yesterday, were addressed to a Chinaman, whose features had assumed a peculiarly anxious expression, as he stood before the official, and in a low, tremulous voice, he begged for a moment's respite, before he would be obliged to depart.
