For August 1905 the net profits were \$1,791,646, and for the two months which ended August 31, 1906, the figures are as follows: Gross earnings, \$12,138,420; working expenses, \$7,304,030; net profits, \$4,834,390. For the two months which ended August 31, 1905, there was a net profit of \$3,429,424. The increase in the net profits over the same period last year is, therefore, for August \$670,933 and for the two months which ended August 31st there was an increase of \$1,404,967.
