**CANADA'S EXHIBIT AT THE NEW ORLEANS EXPOSITION.**

**A Walk Through the Main Building—What is to be Seen There—Hints for the Toronto Show Managers.**

Staves—Come on, Gurney. See the largest exhibition of staves of every kind ever made. One made at Louisville is the best and most useful article for ordinary family houses I ever saw.

The Heato Tea House—They have a canopy of bamboo, a pretty counter, and a cup of their best for all visitors.

Silver Exhibit—Near one of the entrances is a mass of silver in its pure state. It is the Mexican exhibit. The piece weighs 5240 pounds, and is valued at \$14,000.

King & Lomb of Chicago have a splendid display of prepared cereals formed into a canopy and a pyramid, and made entirely of their preparations.

Wines—A California firm show a very large display of native wine and brandies, and as it was just time to see the governor of California, we visited. Both wine and brandy are of excellent quality. I think the brand will exhibit at Toronto. The customs seem to trouble them. Mr. Hill must see a man, I mean the California wine man. An English house shows a very large stock of ale, wine, spirits, champagne, etc.

Tobacco is a very large and interesting show. It begins with the leaf and so on to every manufactured article.

Canned Meats—The Banner packing company has a large space, and their display of all packed meats is the best in the building. I spent over thirty minutes looking through it.

Turkish Store—I do hope our exhibition committee will not allow one of the swindlers in their building. They are here a perfect nuisance, running after ladies to buy. I got to one of the officers in charge to stop it.

Mexican Band—During the afternoon this band of sixty players played various selections; some of them quite native, as their songs come in at intervals. I tried to talk, but forgot all my Spanish, and could only utter a few words at a time. The band is a very fine one, and a credit to any country.

Russian Exhibitor—I got very unpacked. Jamieson shows a splendid exhibit of all her native growth and manufactures. A floating stove is one of the features; the piece on exhibition weighs about five tons, and don't sink. We took it up and pushed it down, but it came again.
