LONDON, Jan. 28.—The subject of dispute between the United States and Great Britain in regard to the Canadian fisheries was brought up in the House of Commons this afternoon. Sir James Fergusson, Parliamentary Secretary of the Foreign Office, in answer to enquiries, said the Government had been conferring with the Government of the United States on the question. The Canadian fisheries, he said, were very valuable, and the Government had followed a policy concerning them which had been adopted by preceding Governments and would maintain the rights of the colonists with every desire to conciliate the United States. The Government was unable at present to narrate the whole course of the negotiations with the United States, but could state that despatches had been received which were of a pacific character, and afforded material grounds for hope of a final settlement of the dispute.
