ANOTHER DUEL.

Krupp's Resident Agent Shot and Killed by an Officer.

BRUSSELS, Dec. 30.—Major Gillain of the Guards and Eugene Vanderberg, Krupp's resident agent, fought a duel in a private garden on the Bois de la Cambre last night.

Vanderberg was shot through the heart and died instantly. The two men had been on bad terms for several months in consequence of their rivalry for the favors of a notorious woman. On the first exchange of shots Gillain's chest was grazed. On the second exchange Vanderberg fell dead without a word of sigh.

Vanderberg was exceptionally popular among officers and business men in this city, and the announcement to-day of the manner of his death has made a painful impression in military circles.

Gillain is considered to have been blameless in the affair and he probably will receive more than the nominal sentence passed usually upon military soldiers. The woman in the case has disappeared.

TRAFFIC IN HUMAN FLESH. An Italian Arrested for Selling a Woman.

NIAGARA FALLS, Dec. 29.—James O'Neill, an Italian padrone here, has been arrested for selling a woman to a New York man. Jack Parma paid \$27.50 for Annie Moggs. She returned to O'Neill and complained of her treatment she had received from Parma.

INDIAN AFFAIRS. The National Congress Favor Home Rule for the West.

CALCUTTA, Dec. 30.—Seven hundred delegates were present at the meeting to-day of the Indian National Congress at Allahabad, for the purpose of discussing the question of home rule for the people of India. The resolution was referred to a committee, but the manner of its reception showed the delegates to be in favor of the movement for a national Indian legislature.

Another resolution was introduced asking the Indian government not to take the currency question before the public had been enabled to discuss the report of the Horebhall committee on the subject, and a resolution was also passed demanding the separation of judicial from executive functions in Indian officials.
