The biggest armor-clads in the world are the Italian Italia and Lepanto, sister ships, each of 15,900 tons displacement. Next to them come the mouster English battle-ships of the Royal Sovereign class, vessels of 14,150 tons displacement. These in turn will be surpassed by the Magnificent and the Majestic, each of which will displace 14,900 tons. The largest armor-clad over which the French flag floats is the Admiral Baudin, of 11,900 tons, and next to her is the Lazare Carnot, only eighty tons smaller. Germany's largest armor-clad is the Brandenburg, of 9,840 tons. Austria has never built any armor-clads save those of moderate dimensions, her largest, the Tegetthoff, being of 7,390 tons. Spain's largest is the Pelayo, of 9,900 tons.


