

TARVIA KILN AT ST. THOMAS BURNS

Car Barns, Lumber Yard Are Also Damaged

LOSS NOT YET DETERMINED

Two Dynamos Destroyed, Valued at \$3,000 Each

ST. THOMAS, Oct. 26.—(By Staff Reporter)—Fire, which originated in a kiln used for heating tarvia for the public works department, caused considerable damage to the city's street car barns, the lumber yards of E. S. Hatch and a couple of dynamos stored in the car barns, late this afternoon.

The tarvia kiln, which is situated at the corner of Stanley and Talbot streets, not far from the car barns, became overheated in some way and the stiff breeze caused the tar to blow. The fire spread to the lumber yard of Mr. Hatch, which adjoins the car building, and after destroying a dry kiln and a quantity of lumber it finally reached the car barns. The dynamos, which were purchased from the Traction Company some years ago, but which have never been used by the city, were destroyed, largely by water used in extinguishing the flames. The actual loss is not known as yet.

while the terrific heat also burned through some stoma wires of the M. C. R. which passed near by. The entire street car building was only saved by the prompt work of the fire department, and it is stated that the actual damage to the building will not be serious.

The dynamos, which are valued at approximately \$3,000 each, have been offered for sale at two or three occasions, and only a few months ago the city fathers refused an offer of pre-war prices for them, but it was thought that it might be possible for the city to utilize them in transmitting power for street railway purposes.

SUCCESSFUL DRIVE

At noon to-day, the closing hour of the daily campaign for membership for the Chamber of Commerce, the teams in charge of the city had reached within 50 of the objective of 360. No less than 90 new members were enrolled to-day and it is expected that by tomorrow night the objective will have been reached if not exceeded.

The results are exceeding the expectations of even the most optimistic workers. Patriotism of a municipal nature has never been so keenly felt as before and many who predicted that a campaign for membership in such an organization would be an absolute failure, are now willing to admit that they were mistaken and are now predicting that St. Thomas will in a short time be among the foremost cities in Western Ontario, a position which it should have occupied many years ago. The canvassers are meeting with very few rebuffs, and to-day practically every business man has taken at least one membership. The memberships are not confined entirely to the business men, however, for many private individuals have become interested.

SAYS LIQUOR STOLEN.

A prominent Aylmer man has been summoned to appear before Magistrate Hunt on a charge of violating the Ontario Temperance Act. It is alleged that he obtained something like 100 cases of booze recently and that it disappeared in a few shorter space of time than it would take to consume the liquor for private use. The charge is by License Inspector Ross and is that the Aylmer man is alleged to have sold liquor contrary to the O. T. A. The accused claims that the liquor was stolen and that he did not sell a single bottle to anyone.

CONTRACTS AWARDED FOR NEW WALKERVILLE SCHOOL

WINDSOR, Oct. 26.—The contracts for Walkerville's 42-room High School on Huron street has been awarded to S. E. Dismore & Co., of Windsor; Drake, Avery & Co., Hamilton, the plumbing, heating and ventilating contract, and Miller-York, of Windsor, will do the electrical work. The total amount of contracts let on the school is \$497,395, which is remarkably close to the \$500,000 estimated by the architects. Work will be started this week by the Dismore Company.

DR. WIRTH GIVEN CONFIDENCE VOTE

New German Ministry Is Indorsed By Reichstag.

POLICY IS ANNOUNCED

Government Will Not Alter Stand On Upper Silesia.

BERLIN, Oct. 26.—(Associated Press Cable).—The Reichstag this evening voted confidence in the new ministry of Dr. Wirth. The vote was 230 against 132. The majority was made up of Majority Socialists, Independent Socialists, Centrists and Democrats. The vote was taken after Dr. Wirth, who remains as chancellor, announced to-night the personnel of the new Cabinet formed by him and his policy.

THE CABINET.

The Cabinet is as follows: Chancellor and minister of foreign affairs—Dr. Wirth. Vice-chancellor and minister of the treasury—Gustave Adolph Bauer, Socialist. Minister of the interior—Adolf Koester, Socialist. Minister of defense—Herr Gieseler, Democrat. Minister of economics—Robert Schmidt—Socialist. Minister of food and interim finance—Andreas Hermes. Minister of posts and telegraphs—Johann Giesberts, Centrist. Minister of labor—Dr. Brauns, Centrist. Minister of communications—Herr Greener, no party. Minister of justice—Herr Radbruch, Socialist.

The office of minister of reconstruction was left until for the present, Dr. Wirth announced.

In making his announcement Dr. Wirth declared that the new Government's viewpoint regarding Upper Silesia differs in no way from that of the preceding Government. He declared that the German Government would protest against the recent decision of the council of the League of Nations concerning Upper Silesia, on the ground of the equality of the allied supreme council's having referred the question to the League of Nations. This procedure, he said, was not provided for by the Treaty of Versailles.

SAYS ANGLO-JAP PACT HANDICAP

Lord Northcliffe Declares Alliance Has Outgrown Usefulness.

LONDON, Oct. 26.—(Associated Press Cable).—The Anglo-Japanese alliance "undoubtedly is the dominating factor which now prevents an unfettered action by Great Britain, Japan and the United States to solve the problems of the Pacific," declared Lord Northcliffe to a Reuters correspondent, who interviewed the British publisher in Hong Kong yesterday. The interview was held in London to-day.

According to the correspondent's dispatch Lord Northcliffe gave this as a reason for his opinion that the alliance placed the United States "outside of the very definite arrangements for the control of China."

USEFULNESS GONE.

"During the last two years," the publisher is quoted as having said, "I have been gradually coming to the conclusion that the Anglo-Japanese alliance has outlived its usefulness. Japan faithfully carried out the compact during the war and she should be well rewarded for her services. The purpose of the Washington conference is to reach a mutual agreement, but the United States is handicapped by an arrangement already made by Japan and Great Britain concerning the chief problem of the Pacific.

"It cannot assist in establishing co-operation in the Pacific, and it prevents reconciliation of the diverging interests of Japan and the United States. At present China cannot give satisfactory national guarantees, so there is urgent necessity for making international assistance to China a practical possibility.

"I hold that there can be no solution of the Pacific problem which does not rest on the solid foundation of Anglo-American friendship and co-operation. Unfortunately, the Anglo-Japanese alliance has been prolonged beyond the point where it is understood by the Americans or is liked by the Chinese."

HAS NO DOUBT OF WEST'S LOYALTY

Premier Merely Holds Farmers Lack Regard For Industries.

SAULT STE. MARIE, Ont., Oct. 26.—(By Canadian Press Staff Correspondent).—Speaking to an audience of about 2,500 persons, in the rink here to-night, Premier Melchior dealt with a charge of the agrarians.

"Mr. Crerar says that I have charged the Western farmers with disloyalty," said the premier, "and he stands in righteous indignation on behalf of the West to defend them against this vilest of imputations. When Mr. Crerar says that I say he usually invents what I say first, I never uttered the word 'disloyalty.' I never challenged their loyalty, but I do say that not only those people, but more to his discredit—Mr. Crerar himself has very little regard for the conditions of industrial Canada, very little interest and concern."

AN EXAMPLE

The premier went on to quote Mr. Crerar as stating: "If we cannot make shoes as cheaply in Canada as in the United States, then we have not reached the time in Canada when we should be making shoes."

This statement showed very little concern for the industrial works of Canada, declared Mr. Melchior. Mr. Crerar was in the position of every recent immigrant to this country, "but the position is far less creditable to him, if his policy was carried out we would have no industrial Canada to-day, but would simply be a supply depot to the United States," declared the premier.

Speeches were also delivered by T. E. Simpson, candidate in West Algoma, and Hon. R. J. Manion, of Port William, minister of soldiers' civil re-establishment.

Premier Melchior left for North Bay after his meeting here.

Someone Forgot

FREDERICTON, N. B., Oct. 26.—The second meeting of the Agrarian campaign in the Maritime Provinces has been cancelled. Hon. T. A. Crerar arrived here this afternoon to address the electors of York-Sunbury, but found there had been a misunderstanding. The meeting had not been advertised and there was some mix-up in the dates.

FLORIDA HIT BY TERRIFIC STORM

Fruit Yield Badly Affected and Property Loss High.

JACKSONVILLE, Fla., Oct. 26.—(Canadian Press Dispatch).—The entire waterfront of St. Petersburg was wiped out by the gulf storm yesterday, the worst gale the city has ever experienced, according to a message received by The Times Union to-night.

The message, which was sent by a resident of St. Petersburg, who went by automobile to Brooksville, said that Passanville was also reported wiped out.

"St. Petersburg," the message added, "is badly damaged, and observations coming through county indicate 90 per cent. citrus fruit gone. All previous storms no comparison. Town in total darkness for at least three days."

The storm passed out to sea this morning.

BAD AT FORT MYERS.

FORT MYERS, Fla., Oct. 26.—(Via Punta Raza cable station).—The fierce gale this section has known in several years raged here for 24 hours, beginning at midnight Monday and attaining a maximum velocity of 100 miles an hour. Transportation services were prostrated, while the property loss for Lee County is expected to total well over a million and a half dollars. Reports from Sanibel and Captiva islands said that water covered the entire islands. Estero Island, near here, on which two beach resorts are located, was badly damaged, the cottages and other buildings being wrecked.

FIVE KNOWN DEAD

TAMPA, Fla., Oct. 26.—Five persons are known to be dead in this city and St. Petersburg, across Tampa Bay, as the result of yesterday's storm, which caused a local property damage estimated between \$1,000,000 and \$2,000,000.

SACRAMENTO, Cal., Oct. 26.—Numerous houses were unroofed, windows were broken and other damage, as yet unestimated, was done by a strong wind approaching the strength of a tornado which swept through the southern and eastern part of Sacramento to-day.

The wind was a path approximately three-quarters of a mile wide through the district.

A torrential rain fell after the wind storm and flooded the streets and gutters.

MORE EMPLOYMENT IN DOMINION REPORTED

OTTAWA, Oct. 26.—(Canadian Press Dispatch).—A slight increase in the volume of employment was reported by some 5,000 employers during the two weeks' period ending September 24, according to a statement to appear in the forthcoming issue of the bulletin of the employment service for Canada. At the end of the period under review the index number stood at 90.2, as compared with 89.6 for the fortnight ending September 10.

The volume of employment reported by employers during the summer, the bulletin will declare, has never exceeded that of last midwinter, although the index number for the period ending September 24 was higher than for any period since January 15 of this year. Compared with the corresponding fortnight of 1920, the bulletin will say, employment in all parts of the country showed marked shrinkage. The situation in Ontario and Quebec was less favorable than in other provinces, due to the fact that manufacturing showed more weakness than any other group. About 90 per cent. of the contractions in the manufacturing industries were concentrated in these two provinces. Reports for the fortnight showed 678,054 persons employed, as against 674,110 for the previous fortnight.

HELP MUNICIPAL WORK.

TORONTO, Oct. 26.—The Drury Government gave a deputation from the City of Toronto definite assurance to-day that it would bear one-third of the excess of cost of carrying on municipal public works during the winter months as measures of unemployment relief.

The deputation stated that there was about \$15,000,000 worth of work that could be done if it was deemed advisable to go on with it.

The city was represented by Dr. Hastings, M. O. H. Property Commissioner Chisholm, Finance Commissioner Ross and City Auditor Scott.

CIVIL SERVANTS MUST BE QUIET

Warned Not to Take Active Part In Politics.

DRURY ISSUES STATEMENT

Cabinet Ministers Only Appear To Be Exempt.

TORONTO, Oct. 26.—Premier Drury and his ministers may get all the excitement they can out of the federal election campaign, but any civil servant who tries to emulate them is liable to wake up in the morning and find himself jobless. To-day Mr. Drury, fearful for the reputation of the civil service, sat down and dictated the following, which will go out as a circular to all departments of Government.

"The attention of the Government has been drawn to statements that certain officials in the employ of the province are taking an active part in the political campaign. I think it therefore advisable to make it perfectly clear to all parties concerned that the desire and direction of the Government is that public officials will not participate in election campaigns, and those who fail to heed this requirement will be held responsible for their actions. How to make it

Use level measurements for all materials

3/4 cup shortening
1 1/2 cups sugar
Grated rind of 1/2 orange
1 egg and 1 yolk
2 1/2 cups flour
4 teaspoons Royal Baking Powder
1 cup milk
1 1/4 squares (1 1/2 oz.) of unsweetened chocolate (chopped)
1/2 teaspoon salt

Cream shortening. Add sugar and grated orange rind. Add beaten egg yolks. Sift together flour, salt and Royal Baking Powder and add alternately with the milk, beating well in one beaten egg white. Divide batter into two parts. To one part add the chocolate. Put by tablespoonsful, alternating dark and light batter, into three greased layer cake pans. Bake in moderate oven 20 minutes.

FILLING AND ICING

3 tablespoons melted butter
3 cups confectioner's sugar
(Powdered sugar may be used but does not make as smooth icing.)
Grated rind of 1/2 orange and pulp of 1 orange
2 tablespoons orange juice
1 egg white
3 squares (3 oz.) unsweetened chocolate
Grated rind of 1/2 orange and pulp of 1 orange

Put butter, sugar, orange juice and rind into bowl. Cut pulp from orange, removing skin and seeds, and add. Beat all together until smooth. Fold in beaten egg white. Spread this icing on layer used for top of cake. While icing is soft, grate with unwetted chocolate shaved in fine pieces with sharp knife (use 1/2 square). To remaining icing add 2 1/2 squares unsweetened chocolate which has been melted. Spread this thickly between layers and on sides of cake.
