P. H. Bartlett (London) and W. E. Fitzgerald (Watford) for plaintiff. R. I. Towers (Sarnia) for defendant. Action to set aside deed and agreement and for damages for malicious prosecution, arrest and detention. Judgment: The plaintiff is not entitled to a declaration of ownership of the land, nor to the incidental rights and moneys claimed. There will be judgment dismissing the action as to this portion of the claim. It is admitted that plaintiff is entitled to damages for malicious prosecution, arrest and detention unless defendants can escape by reason of the arrest being made beyond the territorial jurisdiction of the magistrate. I do not see that defendants can ask to profit by the circumstance that the warrant was illegally or irregularly executed. They had no jurisdiction for their act, I assess the damages at \$300, and allow plaintiff \$55 on the three small terms claimed by him. There will be judgment for plaintiff for \$335, with costs, according to the tariff of this court.
