

The German claim that in peacetime 1,100 ships per day arrived at British ports is approximately correct. But when it is considered that 780 of these were engaged in local coasting traffic, most of which is now handled on land, the maintenance of overseas traffic, at least up to the point ensuring full supplies necessary to feed Britain seems fully assured. In the three days from February 14 to 18, as shown in Sir Edward Carson's figures, 100 ships more per day arrive at and sailed from British ports than on the average of the first two weeks of the submarine scare. If Britain were dependent upon foreign countries for its coal, or iron, or other vital ores, the blockade might have a chance of crippling industrial life. Coal is \$60 a ton in Italy, and as high in France, because of the using of shipping for munition and food carriage. Britain produces one-fourth of the world's coal. The problem of the British, therefore, is to concentrate upon the bringing in of food and wool, oil. etc., and the many radical measures adopted by
