STRIKERS FORCED BACK AT POINT OF BAYONET

Glace Bay, Dec. 10.—The strikers are becoming very boisterous during the past few weeks, and hardly a day passes but some arrests are made for interference and intimidation.

This morning upwards of six hundred strikers assembled at Dominion No. 8 Colliery and caused considerable trouble before they were dispersed.

As the workmen approached the gates intending to go to their work, the strikers formed up in deep lines, cutting off the street leading to the colliery and it was only upon the appearance of the soldiers with fixed bayonets, and a squad of police that the throng of strikers was dispersed and put to flight.

THRILLING EXPERIENCE WITH A WHALE.

James Simms and Robert Hersey, two members of the crew of the schooner Kerwood, Capt. John Simms, had a thrilling experience with a whale while out trawling, off Seal Island. They had pulled up about fifty fathoms of the trawl, when they felt a heavy weight on it, and at the same time the dory began to go under. The two men stared at each other for a moment, as neither could imagine what was the matter, but it seemed they had hooked a whale with the anchor, and he was making off with them. Hersey tried to let go the gurdy, but was unable to do so, so they let the turn slip until they had payed out several fathoms of line, when the whale reached bottom, and they were able to let go the turn. They no sooner had this done than the whale made another dive, and they held on the buoy till they thought he had dragged them far enough and let go. The buoy immediately sank, but came whale having made off with the anchor and several fathoms of rope, to the surface several yards off, the they judged the whale to be of medium size.

DISTRIBUTION OF SEED GRAIN AND POTATOES TO THE FARMERS.

By instruction of the Hon. Minister of Agriculture a distribution is being made this season of samples of superior sorts of grain and potatoes to Canadian farmers for the improvement of seed. The stock of distribution has been secured mainly from the experimental farms at Indian Head, Sask., Brandon, Man., and Ottawa, Ont. The samples consist of oats, spring wheat, barley, peas, Indian corn (for ensilage only), and potatoes. The quantity of oats sent is 4 pounds, and of wheat or barley 5 pounds, sufficient in each case to sow one twentieth of an acre. The samples of Indian corn, peas, potatoes weigh three pounds each. A quantity of each of the following varieties has been secured for this distribution.

Oats—Banner, Abundance, Danish Island, Wide-a-wake, White Giant, Thousand Dollar, Improved Ligow—all white varieties.

Wheat—Red varieties: Red Fife (beardless), Marquis, Stanley and Chelsea (early beardless), Preston Huron and Pringle's Champlain (early beardless), Bobs (early beardless).

Barley—Six-rowed: Mensury, Odessa and Mansfield. Two-rowed: Invincible, Standwell, and Canadian Thorpe.

Field Peas—Arthur and Golden Vine Indian Corn (for ensilage)—Early sorts: Angel of Midnight, Compton's Early and Longfellow. Later varieties: Selected Leaming, Early Mastodon, and White Cap Yellow Dent.

Potatoes—Early varieties: Rochester, Rose, and Irish Cobbler. Medium to late varieties: Gold Coin, Carman No. 1, and Money Maker. The later varieties are, as a rule, more productive than the earlier kinds.

Only one sample can be sent to each applicant, hence if an individual receives a sample of oats he cannot also receive one of wheat, barley, peas, Indian corn or potatoes. Applications on printed cards or sheets, or lists of names from one individual, or applications for more than one sample for one household, cannot be entertained. The samples will be sent free of charge through the mail.

Applications should be addressed to the Director of Experimental Farms, Ottawa, and may be sent in any time from the 1st of December to the 15th of February, after which the lists will be closed, so that the samples asked for may be sent out in good time for sowing. Applicants should mention the variety they prefer, with a second sort as an alternative. Applications will be filled in the order in which they are received, so long as the supply of seed lasts. Farmers are advised to apply early to avoid possible disappointment. Those applying for Indian corn or potatoes should bear in mind that the corn is not sent usually until April, and that potatoes cannot be mailed until danger from frost in transit is over. No postage is required on mail addressed to the Central Experimental Farm, Ottawa.

Bonds were furnished. Young Knowlton was arrested yesterday on a charge of assault. The boy's father, Fred H. Knowlton, was wounded in the jaw and his mother's forehead was grazed by a bullet while they were in bed early yesterday. Their son was apparently asleep in his room on an upper floor, but a revolver which he acknowledged to be his, was found on the kitchen floor. The boy said he had been asleep all night and had not even heard the shots. He has been subject to somnambulism.
