9.4. To think humbly of myself and with great charity of others, allowing much for the ignorance and sad disadvantages they labour under.

10th. To forbear condemning or speaking evil of

any one.

11th. To pray privately three times a day, besides

my morning and evening prayers.

12th. To receive all pains of body or mind, as tokens of God's love, and be thankful for them, knowing, that whom God loveth he chasteneth, to draw them nearer to himself.

13th. Not to build my hopes of Salvation on my own works or self-rightcousness, but on the "merits of Christ" and the shedding of his precious "blood."

- "'Tis greatly wise to talk with our past hours;
- " And ask them what report they bore to Heaven;
- "And_how they might have borne more welcome news."
