Blates, in Congress assembled:

Your memorialists, exercising the common right of petition, appeal to you in the name of AS ALDERMEN FOR ST. LAWRENCE justice and humanity, to do something to protect our class as well as our race against the evils resulting from what is known as the "Coolie Trade."

This nefarious traffic, more baleful in its consequences to our Civilization than the slave trade, is gradually but surely gaining upon us, and must ultimately overwhelm our class with min. Wherever Chinese labor has appeared it has withered our hopes and blasted what little prosperity life seemed to have in store for us. We have seen our friends and relatives reduced to beggary, because they could not compete successfully with those wretched Mougolian elaves.

We claim that you are not alone our deputed law makers, but you are, or should be our protector. We are your constitutents, we have aided in elevating you to power; do not forget that we belong to the same race, that we are in fact brothers of the same blood among the races of mankind; this should entitle us at least to a more favorable consideration at your hands. The question with us has almost ceased to be one of how much pay we shall have, and has become one of bread, of existence. We beg of you not to stand by and see the work of degradation, beggary and rain inflicted upon us. We appeal to you to put a stop to this infamous Coolie Trade, and thereby save your own people from attendant horrors. While you should keep in view the welfare of the whole human race, do not lose sight of those in whom you are more directly interested.

Not only has Chinese Cheap Labor, wherever introduced extensively, driven white laborers out of the market, but this Mongolian element has brought with it all the blighting curses of oriental life-Leprosy, physical and moral, prevails among these wretched people. Are you prepared to deny your own race the protection of wholesome laws against this avalanche of Asiatic horrors. Some may say that it is too insignificant a matter to require Congressional notice. Do not be decoived; there are already five large houses in San Francisco devoted to this infernal business. With such facilities as these how long will it take to overrun the whole Pacific slope, and then turn the tide with full aweep eastward. It is but a question of time, and we have seen of late years how rapidly the most momentous changes occur in the affairs of nations.

We are an indispensable element in the composition of civilized society. Without the aid of intelligent labor what would your capital or your manufactories be worth? You may drive us out and supplant us with barbarian slaves, but how long will your present social organization remain? "It needs must

We claim, therefore, as children of the Caucasian race, of which you are members, that we are entitled to your aid, comfort and pretection. We claim this, not only as a right due to us, but as a duty you owe to yourselves, and the generations yet to come.

If any real necessity existed for an increase of the laboring forces of the country then there would be some excuse for the importation of Chinese labor, but there is already a superabundance of workmen in every department. Even now thousands of first-class mechanics are idle because there is no work to do, and this misfortune is incressing from year to year, as the population thickens. Therefore, any addition to our numbers from abroad will only aggravate our evils, while it cannot give more than a temporary advantage to the manufactuer and capitalist, whose interests only are directly promoted at the expense of those whose welfare they should foster.

We do not however ask legislation to give us undue advantages; we only ask that in the great labor contest we have a fair chance with our equals. We ask for nothing more and will be content with nothing less.

That this humble appeal may receive favor. able consideration and immediate action, your petitioners will ever pray.
