

Those Bogus A. P. A. Circulars.

Sometimes the confidential circulars of the A. P. A. fanatics get into the wrong hands. A case of this kind is reported from Minnesota. Knowledge Box.

Throw chloride of lime in rat holes. Cool rain water will remove machine grease from washable fabrics.

Clean the head of dandruff and any warm dry feeling by rubbing the scalp briskly with alcohol. Tins may be scoured with little effort.

To keep black ants away sprinkle black pepper in their haunts, or draw a chalk line across their run ways.

Applying a little water often is a bad principle in watering plants and should be avoided. If watering is needed, water thoroughly. Ringworms will yield to borax treatment. Apply a strong solution of borax

three times a day; also dust on the fine dry powder very often. Silver spoons and forks, in daily use, may be kept bright by leaving them in strong borax water several hours. The water should be boiling when they are
